

Chlorine leak alarm sounds

Overcome by chlorine fumes from a slight leak, high school caretaker Dave McKnight was treated by firefighters and a doctor Tuesday morning. He is quite recovered from the mishap now.

Mr. McKnight was hooking a new chlorine bottle into the swimming pool system when he noticed the fumes from the control valve. He went into a classroom for help and the siren sounded to call firefighters to his aid.

He was taken to Acton Medical Centre and was reported to have no apparent medical problem as a result.

Art Burroughs, head of maintenance for North Halton, sped to the scene at once and grabbed the air mask provided at all swimming pools. He and firefighters wearing air packs entered the small attached building which houses the tanks and turned off the valve.

Mr. Burroughs explains there is nothing in the system to cause worry. It's a vacuum system, he says, and if a break should occur the chlorine would automatically be cut off. He agreed breathing chlorine does indeed "set you back a bit" when you're not used to it. He insists there is no cause for concern.

Parents enthused over playground

Speyside area residents will be making a creative playground at the school for their children.

At a special meeting held Monday evening by Pam Sheldon, slides were shown by Herb Piles, a teacher at Pineview school, of various playgrounds through the Toronto area. Norm Howell, principal of Speyside school, explains that anything could be used for the playground, as the children use their imagination to create things.

Anything used

It was agreed by almost everyone present that with left over lumber from construction, old tires and logs, sand, and cracked sewer pipes, local people could get together and make their own playground.

Mr. Howell stressed to the parents that children need something to stimulate their imagination and to get them to take risks to overcome future fears, such as heights, etc. He also pointed out the child needs to fulfill his or her basic physical activity needs such as jumping, crawling, skipping and privacy.

Volunteers for planning, designing, co-ordinating, providing equipment and mater-

ials and advice and the actual building were needed.

Most of the parents and children volunteered for something, and with the examples shown in the slides, Pineview school's present playground, and the proposed M. Z. Bennett school in Acton playground, it is hoped by all involved that something comes of the meeting's objective.

Pigeons killed

Police are investigating the indiscriminate shooting of a 22 rifle across Fairy Lake. The shots apparently come from the sand dune area off Elmore Dr.

About 15 pigeons belonging to Colin MacColl, Cameron Ave., have been shot, with the loss estimated at between \$60 and \$70.

The birds attempt to fly home to their roost in the MacColl garden after being shot, some of them arriving in pitiful condition.

TB, RD year "successful"

The Halton Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association in 1974 enjoyed its "most successful" year since it was founded more than 20 years ago. Association President Mrs. Phyllis McKim said last week.

She told the annual meeting in Oakville that "communication is the only scaffold on which an organization such as Halton TB and RD can possibly be built, and I feel that ours is excellent."

"We are telling the public what we can do towards better health," she said, "and the public tells us what it needs and foots the bill through donations to Christmas seals."

Mrs. McKim told the 45 persons present that the association's main work is in the field of respiratory disease in Halton.

Exercise programs for asthmatic children, smoking withdrawal clinics and seminars for the medical profession have been held during the year.

They designed to combat the chronic respiratory diseases such as asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and cigarette smoking.

She said a large portion of association time and money is spent on pulmonary (lung) function screening programs in industry, and 3,100 persons employed by 50 separate firms were tested during the year.

Abnormal

Of this number, 190 persons registered abnormal readings and were referred to doctors.

Mrs. McKim said health education programs have been increased because of public concern over air pollution and cigarette smoking and the demand for information of the "cause, detection and control" of these medical problems.

Raise \$70,000

Mrs. McKim said 1974 was another "banner year" for the Christmas Seal campaign. More than \$70,000 was raised, for an increase of 16 per cent over the preceding year.

More than 54,000 letters urging support for the campaign were mailed out to homes and companies at a cost of 37 cents apiece.

She said respiratory disease patients were also visited on a monthly basis and referred to social service agencies if required.

Only 12 new active cases of tuberculosis were discovered in Halton last year, while two old cases became reactivated.
