Acton men planning cross-Canada skate

Two young Acton men plan to eatch up to and pass the Great Wagon Train-on roller

Joe Brideau and Ross Marsh plan to set a world precedent, and be the first to roller skate across Canada. They will be leaving Toronto City Hall on June 14, backtracking to hometown Acton, and travelling along highway No. 7 to 27. From here they will continue north, heading towards the west.

The two young men hope to have pledges for each mile they skate, with the proceeds to UNICEF. MacGregor division of Brunswick International is supplying all the skates, parts and repair kits the couple will need for their trek. They will be passing through many small towns and cities and feel Acton will be receiving


