Erin Township Council capped a stormy session by a three-two decision to convey an unopened road allowance on the property of Howard Barbour, Lot 27-28, Con-

The matter was first brought before council in January when Mr. Barbour stated he felt that sometime in the past, the land in question had been deeded to the land's owner when another road over more traversable terrain was opened on the same property.
