No snowmobile curfew change in rural areas

Representatives of the Georgetown Snowmobile Club went to Monday's Halton Hills works committee meeting requesting a lifting of the curfew in the rural areas but went away an hour later with the warning that if the by-law isn't passed soon there could be more restrictions added to the by-law.

Hugh Campbell, John Henselwood and Mark Osborne told the committee there was no need for a curfew in the rural areas.

Campbell told the meeting the 11 p.m. curfew would not allow the snowmobilers enough time to be able to reach the trails, complete a run and be able to return to their homes before 11 p.m.

He pointed out many of the trails by-pass property and continue farther away and trail time, by-pass time and the time taken getting to and from the trails, made it impossible for them to complete a run by 11 p.m.

He continued that there was no need of a curfew in Esqueping since most homes are well back from the road and residents aren't kept up at night by the sound of snowmobiles.

Committee chairman Joe Hurst said the committee had worked hard to come up with a fair by-law and had heard and read briefs from various groups throughout the town. He noted many people wanted a 10 p.m. curfew. Some thought snowmobiles should

be banned in Halton Hills. Hurst pointed out the committee had given the snowmobilers ingress and egress in Halton Hills and wanted a by-law applicable to the entire town, not just urban areas.

Hurst continued that Sergeant Joe Hurst, Halton Regional Police, a former member of the club and a snowmobile enthusiast, had told the committee the by-law was excellent at a behind closed doors meeting earlier this year.

Councillor Ern Hyde said the rural areas were almost as built up as the towns in some districts and thought they deserved the same protection as urban residents. He added he thought the committee had been more than fair.

Campbell pointed out that in Peel county they didn't have a curfew in the rural areas.

Councillor Len Cox

suggested snowmobilers go into Peel region after 11 p.m. Councillor Hyde added, "They are backward over there."

"We asked for input from council and the one who did contribute said ban them altogether. This has been dragging on at council and he is picking up support. If this isn't passed soon then the by-law could end up being a lot more restrictive than it is now," Hurst warned.

He added the committee isn't concerned about just the members of clubs but also other snowmobilers. Hurst noted the police are hoping the clubs will help them in enforcing the new by-law.

The snowmobile club also wanted the right to use plowed areas of parks for ingress and egress. The club was informed the by-law allowed this.

The committee decided to send the by-law to council for third reading next week.

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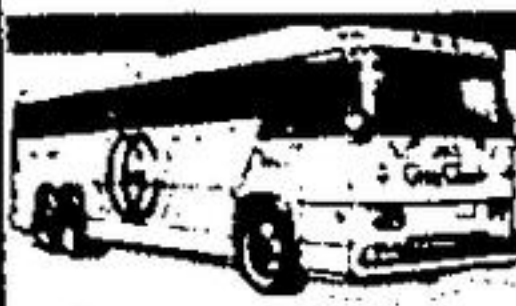
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
