## Sheridan holds convocation

A total of 1,100 students from 60 programs are eligible to graduate from Sheridan College during four separate formal convocation ceremonies this month.

The seventh annual graduation will also mark the official opening of the new college building expansion by the Hon. James Auld, Minister of Colleges and Universities. His opening remarks will be combined with the Friday, May 30 convocation when approximately 200 students will receive diplomas from the School of Business and Secretarial Studies and Computer Studies Division.

Graduation ceremonies will be more formal this year than they have been in previous years, said Registrar and Dean of Student Affairs John Bromby. He added that there appears to be a conservative shift and acceptance among young people toward a more

traditional graduation ceremony, that was once rejected in the late 60's and early 70's.

The revived custom of wearing an epigote will be used again this year, which, when placed on the shoulder of the student symbolizes the change in status from student to graduate.

The Board of Governor's silver medals will be

presented to students in each division of the college who have displayed outstanding academic achievement.

Earlier this month, Sheridan graduated four students from the post-secondary Heavy Equipment Construction Techniques program at the Milton Campus. Another 91 students are expected to graduate from the School of Nursing, Mississauga, in August.
