of the time by the club members. Councillor Dick Howitt pointed out the system was inherited from the former town of Georgetown. He assured council the courts both at Moore Park and Joseph Gibbons parks are open to anyone from Halton Hills not just residents of the neighborhoods.

Councillor Les Daby said, "To be realistic, we can't just build courts and leave them wide open, there has to be some responsible group". He told council the Acton courts are in use from early morning until late at night.

Booth said there is no intention of a takeover at the Moore Park courts. He said it was simply a matter of the maximum use of the courts. He claimed there was still time for public use.

He said the people in Moore Park paid over \$50,000 in lot levies to provide recreation in the area.
