OMB dollar cuts likely won't affect H. Hills

The Ontario Municipal Board has advised the Region of Halton that \$205,500 in Halton Hills projects in the capital forecast for 1975 will be deleted.

The projects included \$50,000 for an administration building study, \$76,000 for arena expenditure, \$59,500 for improvement to park land and provision of recreational facilities and \$20,000 for libraries' renovations and equipment.

However, the OMB has left loopholes for municipalities to continue with their projects. If they can prove the necessity of the project and the reason(s) it is not desirable to defer it to a later year, there's a good chance the OMB will reverse their decision.

Halton Hills treasurer Harry Henderson feels this municipality is in that category. He believes Halton Hills is well within its \$300,000 limit for capital expenditures and resubmission to the OMB will result in approvals.

Mr. Henderson noted that the \$76,000 for the Acton arena roof was way below the original estimate and since the work is already in progress, he saw it being financed out of lot levies or reserves if the OMB still discouraged the expenditure.

The other projects were flexible and at the discretion of council, he said. For instance the \$50,000 suggested for the administration building was a ball park figure because the actual amount was

not known. He felt council could use some of the Halton Hills' staff for the beginning of the project.

Halton Hills would like to consolidate their municipal offices on Halton Road 3 instead of dividing them between the old Georgetown and Esquesing offices.

The OMB has deleted amounts from the forecasts for what the board claims is the steadily rising trend in

unemployment and the increasing burden on the general tax levy caused by debt charges as a result of high interest rates.

"The Board must give careful and thorough consideration to all proposed capital expenditures that are less essential than such projects as sewers, water systems, electric utility extensions, local improvements, local roads, drainage, hous-

ing programs, fire stations and equipment and public transit facilities, which have priority," a letter to Alan Masson, Halton regional chairman explains.

But in Mr. Henderson's view, Halton Hills has a very good chance of getting approvals for the capital expenditures once they resubmit figures with additional explanation for the necessity of the projects.

Fluid Milk Inquiry

The Milk Commission of Ontario by authority vested in it under The Milk Act will undertake an Inquiry into certain aspects of the Milk Industry.

The Inquiry will attempt to determine how, after delivery to the processor, certain elements in the milk distribution chain contribute to the final price paid for fluid milk.

The nature of the Inquiry will include the acceptance of written Briefs and the receipt of Submissions, as well as a series of public meetings throughout the Province.

Persons or groups wishing to make representation to the Commission on any aspect of the Inquiry are requested to write to the Secretary of the Milk Commission of Ontario or to submit written Briefs with the undersigned not later than June 21st, 1975.

Public Hearings will be held at times and places in Ontario to be announced later and those filing Briefs or letters who wish to appear personally will be advised as to the time and place when they will be heard.
