Council gives G.R.C.A. go on swimming

At a meeting of the Eramosa township council Monday night it was decided to write to the Grand River Conservation Authority and request they go ahead with the proposed swimming lessons.

The G.R.C.A. sent a letter to council saying that last year 254 children were enrolled in the summer swimming courses at the Rockwood conservation park. They estimated this year's enrolment will be 110. They said cost per child in the program will be \$4.50 each for the 120 hour seminar.

Badges not factor An earlier letter from the G.R.C.A. requested the township to pay half the cost for a swimming instructor at \$1,600. The township's share would be \$800. The G.R.C.A. had said much of the cost incurred resulted from parents wanting their children to get merit badges as they progressed from level to level. Consideration is also being given to have bus service provided for district children interested in the program living beyond two miles distance of the Rockwood


