He was a doer. His son Sam and grandson Sandy who have carried on the family business are doers, too.

As we've already pointed out ... throughout Acton and Georgetown are example after example of residential and commercial buildings built, added to and renovated by the J. B. Mackenzie and Son Lumber Company.

Yes, the Mackenzies have left their mark on Georgetown and Acton. Shown and mentioned here are only a small sampling of the building the Mackenzies have done in the past 75 years. Forty odd years ago they put out a catalogue that described their contracting business thusly ... "CONTRACTORS. It can readily be seen that combining all divisions of the building business in one, we are able to build Quality Buildings at Low Cost. We are prepared to erect complete, any type of building you may require. We would point out to you the many buildings we have erected during the past twenty-five years. Estimates cheerfully furnished on any building proposal you may have in mind." A lot of people probably found this advertisement convincing. Even more responded to John Mackenzle's profound business philosophy: "A deal isn't a good one unless it works for the two people concerned." The Mackenzies carry on this philosophy today.

In seventy-five years the Mackenzies have left their mark on schools, commercial buildings and homes throughout the Acton, Georgetown area.



The Peacock School. In 1903 the late J. B. Mackenzie took the contract of raising the original frame school on a stone foundation and brick veneering the frame building. He donated the Terra Cotta plaque with a Peacock on it to commemorate its given name (after a pioneer family in the district, so we understand). This former school now makes an attractive country home, and can be seen on the 7th line, two miles north of Ballinafad.

The Chapel St. School The Mackenzies weren't around to build the original Chapel St. School but did add the west wing in 1912. They also built parts of the High School, Wrigglesworth School, George Kennedy School

Glen Williams School, Built in 1949-50, Glen Williams was the first of the present-day schools

built in North Halton. Following this the Mackenzies built Robert Little Addition, the M. Z. Bennett and Acton High School, in Acton.



But, some of the more interesting buildings were not schools at all. The Dominion Seed House Illustrated above is a landmark in Georgetown and well known from coast to coast. It was founded in 1927 by the late W. F. Bradley and Mrs. Bradley on part of the Bradley farm. The Mackenzies have constructed a number of addiflons to accommodate this company's expansion over the years.

The Mackenzies sub-contracted the first building In the area to be constructed of re-inforced concrete. It was the Georgetown Coated Paper Mills, which is now owned by Domter Fine Papers and can be seen.

In 1934 the Mackenzles built the Acton Y.M.C.A. on Mill Street, (No. 7 Highway). It is said that Acton was the smallest town in the world to have a Y.M.C.A. building.

One of John Mackenzie's most pleasing arch-Itectural contributions to the beauty of Georgetown was the Mackenzie residence known as "The Birches". Built in 1915 on the corner of Mill and Park Streets, it remained in the family until
