

George Smith resigns recreation committee

Motion were passed and delegations were heard at the June 2 meeting of the Eramosa township council. All members were present with the reeve presiding.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Ciszler of R.R. 5, Rockwood discussed questions concerning severance. They requested an answer to why council had recommended that they reapply for a severance for their land. The couple questioned whether council personally felt this was a proper recommendation. They wanted to know why other people in the township get severance without too much difficulty and questioned council's definition of unique hardship.

After discussion council advised Mr. and Mrs. Ciszler they would be notified of council's decision.

They said they were concerned that a septic system had been installed on village property without their permission. Township council reaches decision

Council threw up its hands during a special meeting held Wednesday evening, June 4 when five Eramosa residents, two lawyers and the township solicitor spent two hours attempting to solve a boundary dispute which has been periodically erupting for over five years.

The problem was one involving old roads north of Highway 7, between the Third and Fourth Lines of Eramosa near Rockwood. Residents present were Frank Ostrander, his son Gordon, and his solicitor, Art Stumpf and his son, Walter. Mr. Stumpf was also accompanied by his lawyer, and Keith Hamilton whose land is located close to the two properties.

Not settled
Mr. Stumpf's attorney, Miss Heath said she had received from Mr. Ostrander a counsel some time ago, that the matter had been settled. "What problem has occurred which has unsettled it?" she asked.

History of the land, past owners and road deviations were heatedly discussed. Councillor David Masson said he felt the matter was one for a court of law. "There's no person I should have to sit here as a judge because I'm not capable," he said.

After lengthy discussion, the township council requested their solicitor, Albo Lindsay, to draft a by-law to divide

old portions of the York Rd., unopened road allowance, and deviated roads, equally between the adjoining property owners. The deviated roads will be surveyed and costs of surveying plus legal fees, borne by the adjoining owners. A quit claim deed will be drawn up for the old road running through the Ostrander property.

Church service on television

A unique service was held at the Eden Mills Presbyterian church last Sunday. It was attended by the combined congregations of the Presbyterian churches of both Rockwood and Eden Mills.

As climax to the centennial celebrations of the Presbyterian church in Canada, a special service of worship was carried on C.B.C. T.V. Congregations across Canada joined in by having television sets set up in their churches.

Sunday school for the local churches was cancelled and many children were also on hand to view the broadcast.

Residents look forward to the weekly sessions. Mostly it's the ladies at the home who enjoy the goings on. Men of Eden House take the time to play games of cards. On less active days Mrs. Marshall encourages the residents to make some of their instruments. Wristbands with bells attached produce their kind of music. Plastic containers filled with beans and decorated, act as maracas.
