Eminent horsewoman, Di Lindblad of Rockwood, won the first place trophy in the Middleweight Division. Her mount, a purebred Arabian mare, Freena, was attending her first competitive ride, and has only been saddle broken this year.

Anne Vernon of Limehouse

placed third in Middleweight on her young Anglo-Arab, Zamba, while Greg Dales of Rockwood received third ribbon in Junior riding Bubba, a Quarterhorse. Rita Middlemiss, Rockwood, rode Tinkersdale Tuffy to a sixth place.

Rockwood members All are members of the Rockwood Trail Riders, a saddle club noted for the high calibre of its riders, particularly in the field of endurance riding.

Competitive trail riding and endurance riding events require dedication and time-consuming training of horse and rider. Riding 25-30 miles in three to four hours over rough terrain is no easy feat. The horse receives points for his ability and condition. These events are judged by a veterinary team to insure peak athletic ability and performance.
