Jerry Sproat was runner-up in the 18 hole tournament with a 72 and Jim Graham third at 73.

In the low net category Jack Gallant had the low net score of 50, on his whopping 98 handicap reduced a gross score of 152. Julian Zajac took second low net with 76-14-62 and Don Tuck had the third low net score, 82-10-64.

George Hall and Rev. Andy McKenzie tied for the senior trophy with gross scores of 78.

A tie also resulted for the junior trophy, when Frank Houston and Scott Somerville both posted scores of 79.

Trophy for the best net score for a golfer with a recognized OGA Handicap went to Ken Fryer. His net score was 57.

Pierre Pilote selected to Hockey Hall of Fame

Halton Hills resident and former National Hockey League super star Pierre Pilote was named Tuesday to the Hockey Hall of Fame. Only the games top retired stars find their way to the Hall of Fame.

Pilote, considered by many to be the Bobby Orr of the blue-line, in the 1960's, was a premier rearguard with the Chicago Black Hawks for over 10 years.

Pilote broke into the N.H.L. with the Hawks in 1955 and skated with the 'Windy City' crew until 1968 when he was dealt to the Toronto Maple Leafs for winger Jim Pappin. He played one winter with Toronto before hanging up his skates.

During his career he was awarded the James Norris trophy three times as the league's top blueliner. In addition he was named to the N.H.L.'s first all-star team on four occasions and the second all-star team three times.

Tags will be worn by players on the court to signify their membership in the club. Non-members, if not signed in on the guest list, will have to vacate the courts on club days.

Plans to someday enter into competition have been discussed. The Georgetown Tennis Club has already issued an invitational challenge to the Acton club.
