Books that had been approved before don't any longer require approval on an annual basis.

Books that have been approved will be recorded on a card index but once approved, do not have to be included on the list prepared annually. considered as a feasible pro-

Board officials estimated the time and material involved to produce the lists in the vicinity of \$40,000. Books must be approved by the board according to provincial legislation.
