

Acton girls surprise Board, Renaissance disagree on format of June 26 meeting

Acton synchronized swimmers placed first in the advanced routine category in a swim meet Saturday afternoon at Lions Pool. A group from Stratford won in novice. Cathy Ashley placed second in the advanced single category, scoring 51.5, under first place score of 53. Susan Ancker placed second in the novice, 15 year olds and over. Judy Paterson, coach of the swimmers, said that she didn't expect any of the Acton swimmers to place in the top five, and she was pleased with the performances.

The Acton routine was completed the night before the contest. The competition was hosted by the Acton group to expose themselves to competition, according to coach Paterson.

Lynn Virag placed fourth, scoring 49.5 and Liz Cooper placed 10th, scoring 41. Leslie Graham placed 12th.

Judging was performed by six adjudicators from all areas of southern Ontario. They were Sue Adams of Milton, Joan Williams of Burlington, Arlene Harris of Toronto, Mary Butler of Orangeville, Sharon Chandler of Meaford and Anne Pickering of Acton.

Renaissance Chairman Gordon Reade is scheduled to meet with Halton Board of Education June 26 to substantiate claims he has made. Mr. Reade told the board at a recent meeting that it appeared to be board policy to promote permissive teachers before traditional teachers in the system.

According to Board Chairman Judy Alexander, she has been called several times by Renaissance officials who are wanting to negotiate the terms of the meeting.

Board policy indicated that written briefs should be submitted to the board four days prior to the meeting.

Renaissance is reluctant to do this unless the trustees are willing to supply the committee with a list of written questions the board intends to ask.

Trustee Bill Priestner wondered whether the intent was to sit and read prepared questions or to have a dialog.

Trustee Bill Herd summed up what seemed to be the feeling of the trustees when he said the group had agreed to the meeting and the terms. "This is just a further bit of nonsense. If they want to play

games like this, we should ignore them."

Confirm date Chairman Alexander is to contact the Renaissance chairman and confirm the meeting date. Renaissance is a group of parents in the

region who have been consistently critical of the educational operation in the region.

The group has continued to argue that the school system should abide by Judeo-Christian principles.

ter view. Noting the unusual arrangement of Beardmore and Co. owning the water and the town owning the land, the report suggests investigating the possibility of a purchase or donation, which would make further development by the town more reasonable. The outdoor pool, says the report, appears too small for adults and too big for a wading pool.

Shade trees planted in Sir Donald Mann Park in Glenlea could make that area more useful for picnickers, the report suggests. Since the park is not centrally located for a sitting park and not suitable for active sports, because of its hilly terrain, the area could be developed for winter sports like tobogganing and cross-country lessons or winter barbecues. The report adds that one ball diamond at the park needs to be dragged and levelled. Repairs to the home plate area are also needed.

The report was presented in a constructive way and not intended to put added pressure on either the town works or recreation departments.

NOTICE OF INFORMATION MEETING AND NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETINGS ON THE ALIGNMENT OF THE HYDRO TRANSMISSION ROUTE BETWEEN POINT 33 NEAR COLBECK AND POINT 95 NEAR LIMEHOUSE.

The Province of Ontario, by Order-in-Council No. O.C. 1585 / 75 dated the tenth day of June, 1975, authorized and directed the Environmental Hearing Board to review information pertaining to that portion of the approved Hydro transmission route, Bradley Junction to Georgetown, between point 33 near Colbeck and point 95 near Limehouse, as identified in the Ontario Hydro Bradley-Georgetown Environmental Report, and conduct the public meetings necessary to determine if the selected alignment between these points can be modified in any way that, having regard for reasonable cost, will minimize the impact on the agricultural land and undesirable effects upon the environment and report its findings to the Minister of Energy.

The Environmental Hearing Board will hold the PUBLIC MEETINGS in the Hillsburgh Community Centre, Hillsburgh, Ontario, beginning at 10:00 a.m., local time, on Tuesday, July 15, 1975 and for such additional days as may be required in order that interested parties may have an opportunity to present their written or oral briefs and to ask questions concerning the alignment of the Hydro transmission route. If the briefs are in writing the Board would appreciate receiving 10 (ten) copies, if possible, for the use of the Board.

Copies of the information pertaining to the subject matter of the Meetings will be on view in the offices of the Environmental Hearing Board at the address shown below and at the municipal offices of:

In addition, for those people who wish further information prior to the Public Meetings, the Board has requested that representatives of Ontario Hydro make a presentation regarding the proposed route at an INFORMATION MEETING to be held by the Board at Hillsburgh Community Centre on June 26, 1975 at 8:00 p.m. local time. All interested members of the public are invited. Only questions for the purpose of clarification will be entertained at the information meeting.
