

Only atom team survives Ontario Cup first round

Acton atoms were the only local minor soccer club to survive the first round of Ontario Cup play on the weekend. The atoms came up with a strong effort to trounce London Boys Club 8-2 in London, Sunday. Meanwhile, the Acton peewees were whitewashed 5-0 by the West Mall team in Mississauga and, after leading 3-1 at halftime, Acton mosquitoes dropped a 3-3 decision to the Sudbury Steel Metallos team in a game played at the Acton High field.

A hungry forward line supported by a solid defence brought Acton atoms their 8-2 victory. Brian Demone, working hard as usual, scored the first Acton goal and the other forwards followed his example. Scott Albany at inside left scored two goals, free scoring centre Scott McDonough added two and fifth Mlinavovic scored a beauty from 20 yards away. Kenny Kavanagh, a tricky right winger got a goal from close in and Harry Diagne, the team captain gave the London goalie no chance when his penalty kick zoomed into the left corner of the net.

Ron Vanilen at left back played an impeccable game and his defence partner Michael Scott played a strong game, clearing the ball and giving opposing forwards a difficult time. Mark Duess, a hard working serious-minded left half gave a 100 percent effort, in spite of a leg injury which keeps bothering him. Pierre Himeshah at centre half played his position well, stepping into the opposition to hold the middle. Substitute G. White was a great asset to the team and, although he played out of his usual position, he put in a solid hard-fighting game.

Acton goalie Lorenzo Civero was not too busy in this game. He had no chance on the first London goal, which came out of the blue and was too high for him. The second London goal, which came shortly before the end of the game, just slipped through his fingers and dropped over the line.

Halton Hills Rams, league doormats a week ago helped draw the teams closer together in the standings, as they escaped the cellar with two wins. Rams upset the Orangeville Stingers 17-13 in Orangeville last Wednesday night and pushed the Owen Sound Satellites into last place, winning 12-6 at Georgetown Memorial Arena Thursday night.

Group standings released yesterday (Tuesday) by the OLA show Mississauga with an eight point lead in first place, but just eight points separating the remaining six clubs.

Rams held a team meeting in Acton last Monday night in an effort to solve their losing problems. The ball session apparently was a success, since the club walked into Orangeville two nights later and outscored the Stingers in every period for a 17-13 win.

Ron Turkosz, who has averaged three goals a game for the 10 matches he's been in uniform and Bruce Cooksley each fired four goals past Orangeville goalie Bill McLaren. Ian Duff netted a hat trick, Jim Chisholm scored twice, with George Arden, Bruce Green, Bill Fox and Steve Wilson all connecting once.

Orangeville breakaway artist Lindsay Sanderson, stung the Rams with goals five times. Joe Dumont, Bob Noble and Roy Bryan each bagged a brace.

Unlike earlier games, when they allowed foolish penalties to destroy them, Rams kept their cool and sat out just 36 minutes. Orangeville took 55 minutes in the sin bin.
