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CVCA defers action on Starrett land

School bus safety

Refresher courses for school bus drivers plus seat belts, adult supervision, and expanding the bus patrol program were some of the recommendations recently put forth by the Ad-Hoc Committee on School Bus Safety at the annual meeting of the Halton Elementary Teacher's Association.

Submitted to the executive of HETA for further study was the idea of compiling a list of all materials and

resources related to school bus safety for use by principals and teachers by October, 1975.

The executive will also request that school bus seating arrangements be revised with the main aim eliminating children standing on the bus. They'll also encourage principals to expand the school bus patrol in order to include as many buses serving Halton elementary schools as possible.

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
