Former wardens assist at mortgage burning

A slate was wiped clean Sunday morning when the mortgage of St. Alban's Anglican church rectory at 185 Jeffrey Ave. was burned at a special ceremony.

Church records show the rectory was purchased shortly after completion of the Lutton Memorial parish hall. Rev. E. H. Jones was the officiating minister who served the parish from 1954 to 1968. He was the first rector to occupy the new rectory and was succeeded by the Rev. Hank Stokroff.

According to the Rev. Ewing, the mortgage was the last major debt of the St. Alban's congregation.

Officiating at the service which saw the 1957 document demolished in flames was the Rev. Leonard Ewing. Also on hand were people's warden, David Hunter; rector's warden, Grant Puncheon; deputy warden, Mrs. Mary Anderson; treasurer, Mrs. Pat Frizzell and the 1957 wardens in office at time of obtaining the mortgage, Bill

Sidewalk construction tenders cost \$25,000

Halton Hills works committee is calling for tenders for an estimated \$25,000 worth of sidewalk construction to be done in this summer.

Councillor Ern Hyde said at the Monday night meeting that while he would support the item this year he hopes in future years the town staff can build the sidewalks. He said he believes there are qualified people working for the town who could build the sidewalks cheaper than a contractor can.

It was pointed out that the town is doing the work on the small sections of sidewalk to be replaced with the larger projects can be done faster by contractors.

Sidewalk construction will be done by contractors on Guelph, and Queen Streets and Maple Avenue in Georgetown.

In Acton work will be done on sidewalks on Wilbur, Frederick, Elgin, John and Willow Streets.

"Great Convention Debate"

Trip to New Orleans is cancelled

Fellow councillors took the word of Oakville Councillor MacLean Anderson, who said "there is no reason why a council or committee should travel to New Orleans, just to have a party" when Halton Regional Council voted down a convention trip to New Orleans for eight committee members and two staffers Wednesday. The recorded vote ended 11-10, with three councillors absent.

Members of Halton's works committee had passed a recommendation two weeks ago, approving the convention trip Sept. 20 to 25 for all members of the committee plus two staff members at the region's expense. The move prompted "The Great Convention Debate of 1975" when it came before the full council last week.

All should go

Oakville Councillor Carl Eriksen opened the debate introducing an amendment calling for all 24 councillors to attend. "I can't frankly trust any report they (the works committee) might bring back," he chided. Then in a similarly jocular vein, he added "I had thought about sending all the staff, too."

His amendment fell of deaf ears—nobody was in favor of all 24 councillors taking the junket—and it was soon followed by three more amendments. An amendment by Halton Hills Councillor Ric Morrow, calling for just one staffer to go, was not accepted as it negated the main motion.

Another amendment from Oakville's Terry Mannell putting a limit of two on the staff and council, was also voted down. Third amendment from Oakville's Bill Connell suggested five should go, but it also found little support. Session chairman Harry Barrett, mayor of Oakville, was by this time having a difficult time keeping the amendments sorted out.

May permits down

Building permits in the month of May in Halton Hills took a one and a half million dollar drop from the previous peak month of April.

May permits totalled \$1,833,714, while April's total was \$3,420,269.

The total was boosted by industrial permits of \$404,000, and commercial permits of \$70,150.

A \$204,000 addition to Burns Warehouse in Georgetown on Armstrong doubling its size from 20,000 to 40,000 square feet, is now being built by Mountclair Developments, operated by Fred Zorge and George Gray.

Another \$200,000 industrial permit was issued to Mitchell Investments for industrial leasing units on Armstrong Avenue, Georgetown.

A \$65,000 permit was issued for McDonald's restaurant on Guelph St., Georgetown.

House permits dropped from 99 in April to 42 in May, and the value dropped from \$2,834,039 to \$1,143,320.

Swimming pools continue their boom, with 30 permits issued this month, and 46 issued so far this year. Last year at this time 86 pool permits had been issued.

The value of permits issued until the end of May this year, and last year are almost identical, with \$6,498,350 this year and \$6,356,839 last year.
