Motor on bus did burn out

Mrs. Sandra Stansbury of Limehouse, who complained to Halton Board of Education last week that unsafe school buses are being used for school trips, says one of the buses to which she referred definitely lost an engine in the incident-it was not just an overheated motor.

"This is a grave concern to me, as a parent I am concernell as my three children's lives are at stake," she told this newspaper.

"If these are the bus lines' best buses, I would hate to see their worst ones," she added.

The Limehouse woman wrote a strong letter to the Board after a trip to Toronto Zoo on which one bus became engulfed in smoke, the tread on the tires of a second ripped off, and the third got into trouble with a dead battery. Travelways, the firm which owns the buses used on that trip, said in a letter the problems were not as serious as she made it sound.

. Harley Lishman, a Board official confirmed in a letter that one bus had lost its engine and Clifford Shaw of Travelways confirmed in a telephone conversation the engine had burned out, she


