Sinclair competes on the national level and won three gold and one silver medal in the last provincial games.

Russell Gray of Acton placed second in advanced with 107.95 and Barry Buchanan grabbed third spot with 88.35 points. Neil Anderson, also of Acton placed fourth with 81.60. He was followed in fifth place by Rolfe Seiz with 77.35. Denise Forsythe of Oakville

captured the girls advanced, scoring 129.60. She was followed in second place by Karen Van Hula of Acton. In the novice class, Robin Williamson of Oakville garnered first with 78.10. Vicki Hines of Oakville placed second in novice girls, scoring 77.40. She was followed by Acton's Betty Ham-

ilton, who tallied 64.50 points. Mens' novice winner was Ray Kingsmill of Acton with 54.00 over Rolfe Seiz and Eddie Couture, both of Acton, scoring 53.40 and 37.90 respectively. It was the first competition ever for the Acton divers.
