Adult recreation gets attention

Adult recreation in Acton and Esquevas was discussed at length during Thursday's Acton Recreation Advisory Committee meeting.

Ideas such as a men's and women's gym and swim programs were discussed for the coming winter months. Golf lessons during the same months were suggested as was cross-country skiing.

The Ballinacree Community Hall Board told the recreation department they would like to have crafts and square dancing in their area.

Pam Sheldon would like to see woodworking offered for both men and women, using local facilities already in existence.

A stamp, chess and photography club was suggested for the people who are not active in sports. It was suggested by John Cooper, recreation co-ordinator, that people in the community be approached to instruct these subjects and perhaps conduct workshops for three and four weeks at a time.

However, before something like this can be set up, the committee will have to find out what sort of programs the local Y is offering, as they do not want to overlap.

Ed Wood would like to see recreation for the elderly in town. At the present time, swimming is being considered, with the time of day, season and possible transportation being looked into.

Mr. Wood also suggested having the senior residents instructing in some of the crafts and programs for the young.

Single goal snaps Ram win

Halton Hills Rams had a potential four game winning streak snapped by a single goal in Huntsville Saturday night, when they lost to the Hawks 13-12. Rams recovered to upset the second place Orangeville Stingers 12-9 before a small crowd at Georgetown Memorial Arena Monday night.

Rams went into Huntsville with two wins in a row and together with Monday's win over Orangeville, they could have been unbeaten in four tries heading for Owen Sound

tomorrow (Thursday) night. The single goal loss leaves the club in a last place tie with the Owen Sound Satellites.

Saturday night's game was played in almost unbearable heat, but at least three Rams were as hot as the weather. Steve Wilson scored four goals, Bruce Cocksley and George Artem three each out of the Halton Hills total of 12. Wayne Young and Jim Chisholm were the other Halton Hills marksmen.

Rams grabbed a 5-2 first period lead in Georgetown Monday night and staged off a third period Orangeville rally, which threatened to bring the game into the Stinger win column. Clutch saves by Ram goalie Gary Turkoz cooled out Orangeville sharpshooters Bob Noble and Shane Sanderson, who were able to score just one goal apiece. Noble was the Central Junior "C" leading scorer going into Monday's game.

Quick and accurate shooting by Ram aces Ronnie Turkoz and Bruce Cocksley brought them three goals apiece. Jim Chisholm, Andy Broadbent, Steve Wilson, Paul Wilson sniped singles and George Artem potted a pair.

Roy Bryan scored two Orangeville goals. Shane Sanderson, Mike Robinson, Ron Roy, Pete Black, Brad Cotton, Bob Noble and Daryl Hostrauer tallied singles.

Ram general manager Howard Dwyer is almost sure now the team will return to the Acton arena for home games, possibly as early as Thursday, July 10. Work on the installation of a new roof on the Acton building is now completed.

Environmental Hearing Board NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETINGS ON

THE ALIGNMENT OF THE HYDRO TRANSMISSION ROUTE BETWEEN POINT 33 NEAR COLBECK AND POINT 95 NEAR LIMEHOUSE

The Province of Ontario, by Order-in-Council No. O.C. 1585/75 dated the tenth day of June, 1975, authorized and directed the Environmental Hearing Board to review information pertaining to that portion of the approved Hydro transmission route, Bradley Junction to Georgetown, between point 33 near Colbeck and point 95 near Limehouse, as identified in the Ontario Hydro Bradley-Georgetown Environmental Report, and conduct the public meetings necessary to determine if the selected alignment between these points can be modified in any way that, having regard for reasonable cost, will minimize the impact on the agricultural land and undesirable effects upon the environment and report its findings to the Minister of Energy.

The Environmental Hearing Board will hold the PUBLIC MEETINGS in the Hillsburgh Community Centre, Hillsburgh, Ontario, beginning at 10.00 a.m., local time, on Tuesday, July 15, 1975 and for such additional days as may be required in order that interested parties may have an opportunity to present their written or oral briefs and to ask questions concerning the alignment of the Hydro transmission route. If the briefs are in writing the Board would appreciate receiving 10 (ten) copies, if possible, for the use of the Board.
