## M.T.C. to meet residents

Rockwood and district residents requiring information about proposed reconstruction of Highway 7 will have an opportunity to present their queries to of-ficials of the Ministry of Transportation.

According to Ed Stevenson, project manager for Regional Planning and Design, officials will be at the Rockwood town hall on July 15 and 16 from 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. Maps and diagrams, will be available for inspection and members of the Ministry will explain what will be entailed.
