According to Henry Kroes, convener for the Acton Red Cross and organizer of Monday's clinic, 191 people turned out to donate the precious commodity of blood. Forty of these people had to be turned away due to a number of factors. Some rejects were people whose blood was affected by other diseases in the body such as cancer, or people who had taken medicine 24 hours prior
