### Ramautarsingh first recipient of new award

Tom Ramautarsingh, a past president of the Halton Chapter of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, is the first Halton recipient of the S. G. B. Robinson Memorial Award, for outstanding service to teachers.

Ramautarsingh, president of the Halton OSSTF for two years, was chosen for the award by the over 1,000 members of the Halton district. The award is a memorial of Dr. S. G. B. Robinson, first general secretary of the OSSTF and it was struck by the Federation's Provincial Executive Council in June, 1974.

Purpose of the new award is to identify and honor those who have achieved a high standard of service to the secondary school teachers through their organization. Only one Robinson award can be given annually by a district.

An outspoken advocate of teachers' rights, Ramautarsingh twice was elected president of the Halton OSSTF, despite a challenge to his leadership from teachers who felt his sometimes abrasive relations with the Board of Education were damaging the profession. He won easy victories.

Ramautarsingh also achieved the distinction of receiving the Provincial Award of Merit in 1973, the highest award members of the 34,000-member OSSTF can give a practicing teacher.

He received his M.A. in History at Wilfrid Laurier University in 1972 and his Master of Education (University of Toronto) in 1974.

A Georgetown high school teacher, Tom Ramautarsingh has also been active at the provincial level including the Ontario Association for Curriculum Development, Ontario Research Council, Reading '75, '76 (York University), Assisting the Curriculum Branch, Ministry of Education in assessing and reviewing books which are added to the official Ministry of Education booklist.

In his earlier career, he has been among other things, secretary to the Interim School Organization Committee for the Ontario Teachers' Federation before the inception of county boards, delegate to two youth conferences, one in London, England, and the other in Berlin, Germany.

Million High School lun 184 more night school pupils last year and seven more classes. In 1973-74 there were 411 students spread over 2st classes and that figure climbed to 575 pupils in 35 classes last year.

The number of night school students taking courses in Acton jumped from 312 in 1073-74 to 330 last year. There was also two more night classes at Acton High School last year.

Enrolment in night school in Georgetown slumped from 760 in 1973-74 to 077 last year. At the same time there was an increase of two in the number of classes,

Milton also leads the way in night school enrolment growth over the past six

When the program began in 1969 there were 124 students in adult education in Milton and enrolment has grown by 451 pupils over the six year time period. In Georgetown enrolment

has swelled by 368 over the past six years after a 1969 enrolment of 319.

Night school began in 1970 in Acton with 100 students and has now grown by 250 to 356.

In Milton the most popular programs were in the area of general interest courses in which 404 students were registered, an increase of 84 pupils over 1973-74. There were 68 students involved in family studies, 52 in special

#### Halton Hills working region must improve

According to former Halton. Hills engineer Peter Morris there is room for improvement at the region and he thinks problems in Halton can be laid on the province's

Reviewing the time he was in Halton Hills, Morris said "There are problems with the region but I don't think it is the staff's fault or the local and regional councils' fault. Its the fault of the system. I don't think the way the region was set up was the most efficient.

Among the problems at the regional level which have affected his department are the long length of time required to get an answer from the region on a problem, and duplication. "The region was required

to take on things, by legis-lation, which they don't have the staff to handle," Morris said in a recent interview. He added water and sewer service is a good example of something the region was forced to take over but can't operate efficiently.

"Halton Hills is working well but I think there is room for improvement at the region. The biggest problem ship. 
