FIREHOSES LEAD to the scene where a 61-year-old woman and 34-year-old man died early Monday morning in a fire at the Wellington Hotel in downtown Guelph. The cause of the blaze has yet to be determined by investigators.

## Guelph hotel is gutted by fire Mon.

A century-old landmark in Guelph, the Wellington Hotel was gutted by fire Monday, leaving two dead and at least five injured.

Alarm was phoned in at 7.30 a.m. but when firefighters arrived the flames were well advanced. More than 60 men fought the blaze which was not under control for three hours.

Dead are Audrey Birch, an employee of St. Joseph's Home for the Aged and John

Whittaker, a hotel employee. Most of the hotel's 25 or so residents had already left for work when the fire began.

Cause unknown Although the cause of the fire remains unknown, a senior fire official said witnesses reported hearing an explosion.

Some nearby stores suffered smoke and water damage. It is expected there will be a coroner's inquest.
