Jank and Joe Richards each tabbed runs to bring their tally to 10. Pitchers held batters to three walks in the game.

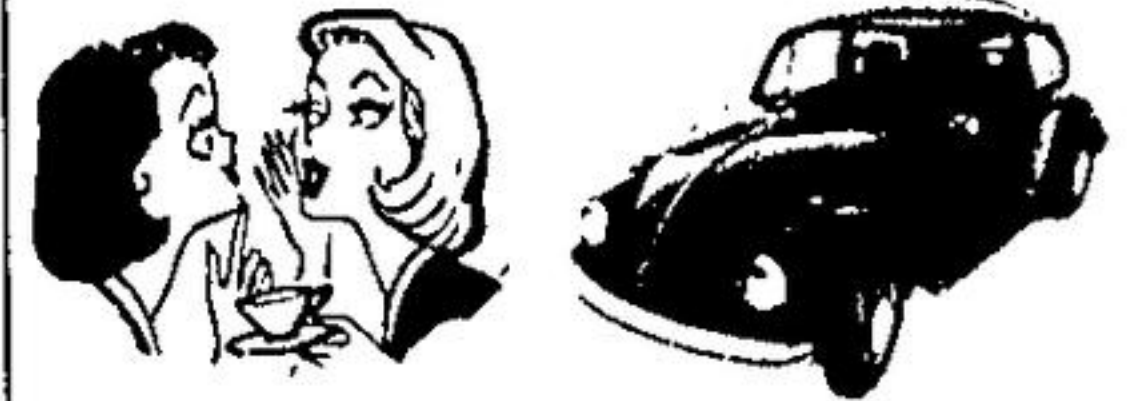
### Squirt girls lower boom
