Endurance trail ride in the heat

Despite the intense heat, over 40 riders finished the Rockwood Trail Riders 30 mile Endurance Trail Ride last Sunday. The annual event attracts entrants from all over Ontario and even from as far away as Michigan. Carefully supervised by a team of veterinarians, the ride takes in some of the area's most picturesque country.

This year's trail included an initial southern ride from the Halton Presbytery Grounds on the Blue Springs Line to St. Helena Rd. and Speyside. Proceeding north on the third and fourth lines, participants encountered the famous three sisters hills of Dolly Varden. A westerly route meandered through the Ponderosa back to the church grounds bringing riders home approximately four hours after departing.

Carefully timed (the event not a race), horses were judged on condition and trail ability.

Hazards

Some of the hazards of the ride included rough bush areas, water crossings, a ride upstream, and twice crossing highway 25 "the worst hazard of all" said ride secretary, Pat Thompson.

Roger Johnson, Acton, brought up the rear of the ride on his motorcycle. His job was to assist riders in trouble or as club member, Frank Anthony, put it "co-operation between the old and the new".

Several events highlighted the day. One horse refused to be loaded into a trailer after his owner withdrew him from competition. Breaking away and galloping into the bush, he led pursuers a merry dance for many hours.

Young Jane Murray of Rockwood usually rides her horse, Casey, western, but decided to put on English saddle on him for the ride. However, after falling out of the English saddle, she justly changed back to the Western.

Mary Smith (nee Hatch of Rockwood) rode her prancing Arabian mare back into the grounds after completing the ride. The mare shied at the triumphant flags and deposited Mary on the grass. Happily rubbing her back, Mary chuckled, "My goodness, she's in better shape than I am."

Trailmaster Paul Thompson worked for months setting up the trail with the help of many club members. The seven person veterinary team was headed by Geoff Faulkner.
