Hunters planning to shoot occurs when daylight is poor pheasants, rabbits and foxes and it is difficult to identify in rural Milton after town council approves a new hunting by-law are urged to exercise caution in the woods and fields.

For the number of shooting accidents in Ontario rose by more than 30 per cent last year compared to 1973. Figures compiled by the

Ministry of Natural Resources show there were 113 hunting aecidents in 1974 compared to 86 in the previous year.

However, the number of shooting deaths among hunters dropped to 10 from 13
