Day bid fails

Grand Prix win at Sam-Son

Jim Day, international equestrian from Hornby, failed in his bid for the \$1500 prize at the Rothmans' Grand Prix of show jumping Sunday, at Sam-Son Farms, Hornby.

First in the event was well-known American rider, Tony D'Ambrosio, riding Symptico after riding a total of three clear rounds. Also riding a no fault course, but losing on time, was Michelle

McEvoy of New Jersey, who took second. Her mount, Sundancer, was trained, shown and owned, for several years, by Sam-Son Farms. Plucky young Kelly Hall-Holland from London, Ontario, came third on her own mount, Regardez. A real crowd pleaser, Miss Hall-Holland tripped one fence in the final round for a total of four points.

Seven faults Riding Happy Fellow, Jim Day amassed a total of seven faults as his mount crashed a pole in the first round and refused with a dramatic rear in the second. His other horse, Out of Sight, didn't make it into the second round.

Canadian Equestrian team member, Hugh Graham, from Limehouse, was not competing.

The 16 jump course.

planned by team coach, Tom Gayford, was laid out in a kidney shaped pattern affording the greatest spectator capacity. Views of the jumps were excellent from most vantage points.

The trickiest obstacle appeared to be the triple combination consisting of three jumps with one gallop stride between. An in-and-out with stretches of water beneath each jump caused several horses trouble but the flower-decorated water jump was successfully negotiated by most contestants.

This Grand Prix, one of several such jumping events held annually, attracted a total of 31 entrants. Riders paid an entry fee of \$65 per horse to bid for part of the \$5,000 in prize money put up by Rothmans. Equestrian Kevin Bacon

came from Australia with his horse, Chichester, to compete. Many riders were entered from the States and Western Canada.

Almost as impressive as the international competitors was the huge transmitter situated in a field below the course to relay the widely televised event by satellite.

Royal Commission on Violence
in the
Communications Industry

By Order, in-Council 1299 75 of May 7th, 1975 a Royal Commission to study the possible harm to the public interest of the increasing exploitation of violence in the communications industry was established. The Royal Commission has opened its offices at Room 810, 151 Bloor Street West, Toronto M5S 2V5. Telephone (416) 965-4593

The Royal Commission's Terms of Reference are:

1. To study the effects on society of the increasing exhibition of violence in the communications industry.
2. To determine if there is any connection or a cause and effect relationship between this phenomenon and the incidence of violent crime in society.
3. To hold public hearings to enable groups and organizations, individual citizens and representatives of the industry to make known their views on the subject.
4. To make appropriate recommendations, if warranted, on any measures that should be taken by the Government of Ontario, by other levels of Government, by the general public and by the industry.

The Royal Commission invites interested persons, groups and organizations to send written briefs or letters on these matters:

1. All written submissions should be sent at least three weeks in advance of the public hearing in your area and in any event no later than May 31, 1976.
2. Persons wishing to appear before the Royal Commission to present oral briefs should forward a written summary to it at least three weeks in advance of the hearing they wish to attend.

Hearings will take place from the Fall of 1975 to the Spring of 1976. A later advertisement in this newspaper will give precise dates and locations.
