He said the woman managed to flee the house after the indecent assault took place, while the boy fled on foot in the opposite direction.

The woman called the OPP and the manhunt was launched.

A dozen officers in six patrol cars took part. The OPP Jet Ranger helicopter was called in from Toronto Airport, and the German Shepherd tracking dog was detachment.


