

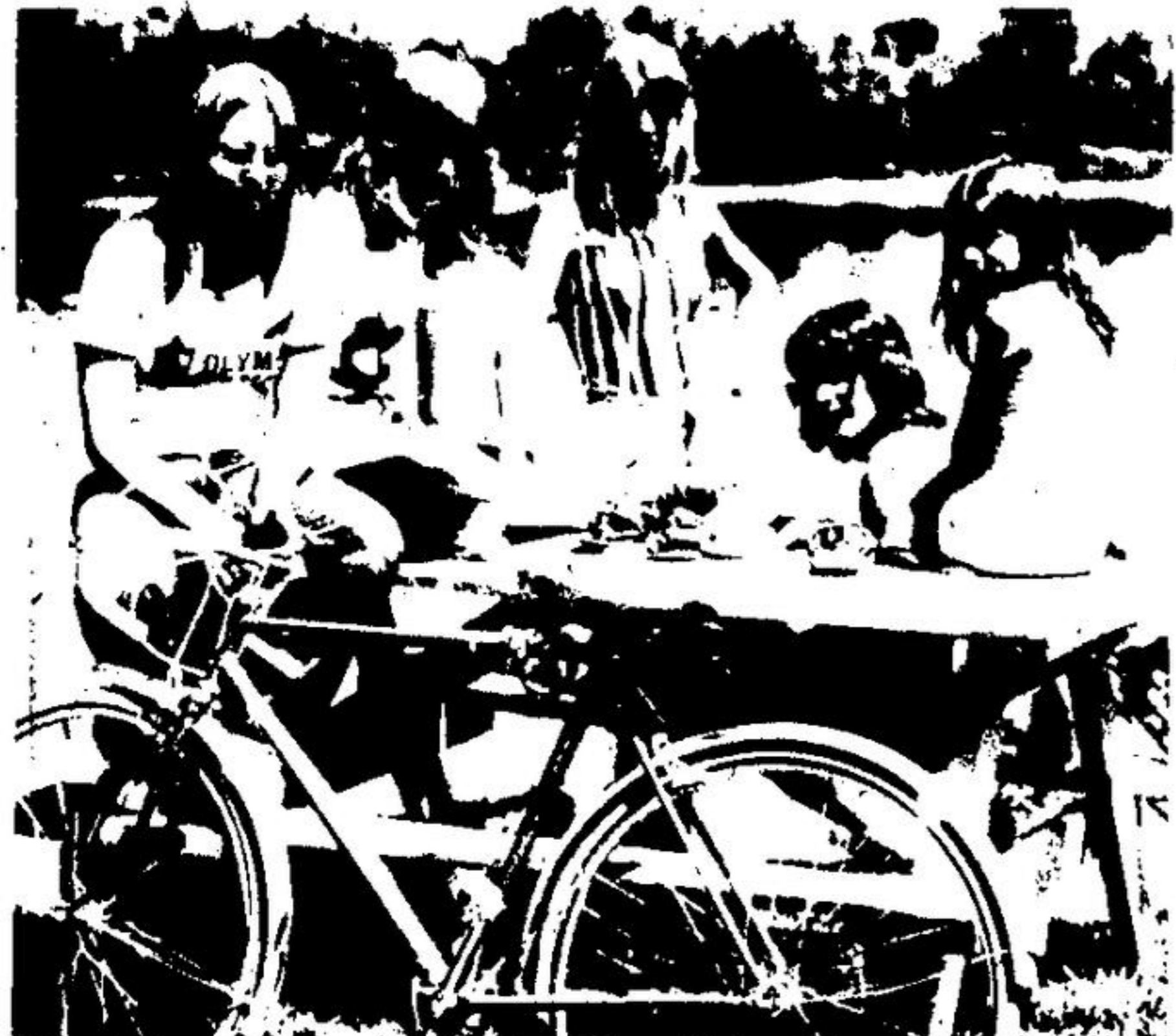
New adventures to be found in warmer spots of globe

Seniors will get I.D. cards

Senior citizens in the area will be among those from across Canada to receive special identification cards issued by Health and Welfare Canada.

The cards are being sent automatically to all Old Age Security recipients 65 years of age and over. The department emphasizes the fact that there is no need for anyone to file application cards as being mailed automatically to eligible persons.

Three months. Department officials also stressed that the entire program of issuing the cards will take approximately three months to complete. Health and Welfare Minister Marc Lalonde pointed out that the identity cards will allow the bearer to benefit from certain consumer discounts, reduced travel fares granted by local and long distance carriers and other advantages accorded to the elderly. It may also be used by pensioners and their organizations in negotiating additional discounts for

senior citizens. Milton Council had earlier considered issuing cards but changed its plan when notice of the federal government action came through.

Board squeeze play ends village centre

Norval's chances of using the empty village school as a community centre went down the drain, Monday night when a "squeeze play" by the Halton Board of Education was rejected by Halton Hills administration committee. The terms of the lease proposed by the board would force the town to agree to pay the appraised market value for the school and grounds, or declare they have no further interest in the property. The only clause in the lease the administration committee found agreeable, was the paying of operating and maintenance costs.

The lease asked the town to make the decision by December 1 of this year, and the transaction, if the town agreed to buy at market value, to be completed by January 1, 1976. Councillor Ric Morrow emphasized the town had repeatedly stated they were willing to pay only a nominal sum "We are not prepared to say we have no further interest in the property." Councillor Roy Booth claimed it would be ridiculous to enter into a lease for the rest of this year, and initiate programs which would have to end by December.

The committee recommended that a letter be sent to the Norval Community Association, explaining the terms of the proposed lease and the reasons the committee could not accept

Milton centre

The official opening of the Maplehurst Correctional Centre and Adult Training Centre will take place on Thursday, July 31.

Located on 90 acres of land at the junctions of Highways 25 and 401 at Milton, these two institutions connected to a central administration building, will provide two separate programs under one administration. Superintendent, John Main, B.A., M.S.W., is presently superintendent of Mimico Correctional Centre.

Inmates in the Adult Incarcerates between the ages of 18 and 24 years. The A.T.C. will accommodate 193 offenders.

The Correctional Centre will house 200 inmates combining first incarcerates and selected recidivists.

With the opening of the Maplehurst Correctional Centre, the Mimico Correctional Centre will no longer function in that capacity. It will be converted to use as a Detention Centre to house inmates serving short sentences as well as persons serving intermittent sentences. All these inmates will be drawn from the Toronto Jail population and will reduce its load by approximately 200 men.

An especially unique aspect of the Maplehurst complex is that 30,000 square feet have been set aside within the institution for lease to private industry who in turn will provide paid employment for inmates.

To date, one industry, Pedalpower (Canada) Limited, has agreed to establish a manufacturing operation at Maplehurst to produce a newly designed electric wheelchair for handicapped persons.

This wheelchair has been designed by Dr. Jan Koreska at the Hospital for Sick Children and is expected to be produced at approximately one-half the cost of any similar chair now on the market.

Parnell Foods Ltd., has been awarded the contract to supply food services for the institution.
