

Reviews rules about trailers

There are some important regulations for the operation of recreational trailers in Ontario says Cons. Larry Scott of the Milton detachment of the O.P.P. He passes on the following:

Trailer must be registered and licence plate attached on rear of trailer clearly visible and lighted at night.

Lights and reflectors are dependent on the size and style of the trailer.

Rear view mirrors must provide a clear view of the

road behind the trailer.

Brakes on trailers with a gross weight (vehicle and load) of 3000 lbs. or more.

Safety chains as a secondary means of attaching the trailer to the towing vehicle, in addition to the hitch.

It is illegal to:

- Haul an insecurely loaded or unsafe trailer.
- Carry passengers in a trailer while it is being towed.
- Haul more than one trailer behind the towing vehicle.

C.V.C.A. to acquire \$1000 acres in area

The Bruce Trail Association has requested the Credit Valley Conservation Authority purchase a parcel of land north of the Terra Cotta Park, outside conservation acquisition area.

The request occasioned much discussion as members argued the value of the purchase at a recent C.V.C.A. meeting.

"What the hell are we buying property for people to tramp over?" bellowed mayor Tom Hill.

The property in question consists of 100 acres in seven parcels with separate owners.

It was pointed out there were still 1,000 acres of land yet to buy within the C.V.C.A. acquisition area. General Manager Harry Watson stated one piece of property, fronting on 32 Sideroad and 5th Line, had been appraised and an offer made.

Ban mini bikes

Motor bikes and mini-bikes will be banned from the Silvercreek Conservation Area next year.

Although the Reformation, Land use and Wildlife Advisory Board of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority has expressed concern over the damage being done to the park by such vehicles, Parks and Recreation Advisory Board declared a lack of funds for fencing forced them to delay fencing until next year.
