There are some important regulations for the operation of recreational trailers in Ontario says Cons. Larry Scott of the Milton detachment of the O.P.P. He passes on the following:

Trailer must be registered and licence plate attached on rear of trailer clearly visible and lighted at night. Lights and reflectors are dependent on the size and

style of the trailer. Rear view mirrors must

provide a clear view of the

road behind the trailer. Brakes on trailers with a gross weight (vehicle and load) of 3000 lbs. or more. Safety chains as a secondary means of attaching the trailer to the towing vehicle, in addition to the hitch. It is illegal to:

Haul an insecurely loaded or unsafe trailer.

Carry passengers in a trailer while it is being towed. Haul more than one trailer behind the towing vehicle.
