Remote spots appeal to traveller

This week, Susan Nelson
continues her account of her
travels.

The Shetland Islands were
annexed to Scotland in 1872
when King Christian I of
Norway and Denmark
pledged them as a dowry for
his daughter Margaret who
married James III of

Scotland. Though five hun-
dred years have passed the
islands still retain a distinc-
tive mixture of Norse and
Scottish customs and
traditions.

What initially interested
me was the remoteness of the
islands and how little I knew
of them. I always associated
the name Shetland with the
special breed of ponies and

with wollen goods.
To reach Lerwick, the
county seat and centre of
industry for the islands, one
must take boat from Aber-
deen. This journey is a full 12

hours if the weather is good -
and slightly uncomfortable.
Most people travelling, other
than the islanders, are ornithologists who go to observe
some rare and virtually
extinct bird species, like the
skua. Also a lot of botanists
and geologists find the
Shetlands a suitable place for
research in their respective
fields. The islanders are very
protective of their natural
resources.

Big event
Lerwick is situated on the
largest island known as
Mainland. The ship docks
only twice a week and it is a
big event. Everyone makes a
point of knowing who the
visitors are and why they are
there. This island is the most
heavily populated and is
gradually becoming a
commercial area as more
industries relocate from the
smaller outer islands due to
labour shortage. The children
must come to Lerwick for
high school and later jobs if
they intend to remain and
support Shetland's economy.
Self-sufficiency for the outer
islands is a near impossi-
bility.

It took another 12 hours on
the MV "Earl of Zetland" to
reach the outer isle of Unst
which is "Ultima Thule" - the
most northerly place in
Britain. Though the distance
north from Mainland to Unst
is only forty-two miles the sea
is choppy and the 3000 ton
cargo carrier must deliver
supplies to Bressay, Whalley,
Yell and Fetlar. These
islands, like Unst, are
sparsely populated and far
from the hustle-bustle of
Lerwick.

Accommodation
I arrived at Baltasound, the
port for Unst, just as the sun
was setting and a damp mist
hid everything from sight.
Upon asking for accom-
modation I discovered that
there was one hotel which
was closed for the winter,
and one guest house run
by an 85 year old lady.
Quite evidently Unst had not
been hit by inflation very
badly. I was charged only 2
pounds (\$5.) for one week full
board.

The island has only 900
inhabitants mostly living in
Baltasound and the R.A.F.
station in Haraldswick. The
only places of employment
are a well-stocked general
store and a small woolen
factory. Crofting has just
about died out and every-
where I travelled on the
island there were small
deserted and nearly ruined,
grey stone cottages
reminiscent of the days when
crofting was a profitable
enterprise. Now these huts
are used for sheep pens and
for dumping animal car-
casses. Fishing, though
popular here, is more a
pastime than a source of
income. The currents and
strong winds force fishermen
to stay inshore.

A car is not a necessity
except for those who work at
the R.A.F. and radar
stations. Most of the people
are older and content with
staying put. I borrowed a
bicycle from some neigh-
bours and found it adequate
at first but soon exhausted
myself. The island, though
only ten miles long and five
miles wide, is very hilly and
the roads are rough. An
R.A.F. truck stopped and I
was only too glad to throw my
bicycle in the back and get a
lift home.

Saturday night in the bar at
the Baltasound hotel is a must
for everyone. The islanders
treat it as the high point of
their week. The enter-
tainment for the evening
was all traditional Scottish
songs and ballads as well as a
lot of local humour. After
such a merry and inebriated
night it is understandable
why only six or so of the
eighty people registered on
the parish roll ever turn up at
the church the following
morning.
