Organizers of the Fun Fair were quite pleased with the evening, and hope the affair continues to grow in





## Consider site for senior housing

After lengthy discussions with Sid Kaye of the Ontario Housing Corporation last week. Erin township council passed a motion requesting that a survey be made to determine the need for senior citizens apartments in the township and the village of Hillsburgh combined.

At a meeting with council, Mr. Kaye advised them the survey would take two to four months to complete, a site of of not more than five acres and not less than three must be found close to if not in Hillsburgh, to be close to amenities. Two sites are already being considered. The construction of the spartments could start next spring.

('ost Mr. Kaye told council that 90 per cent of the construction would be financed at federal level, and 10 per cent at

provincial. The only cost to the municipality would be 712 per Bunch Carrots cent operating losses. The rest would be absorbed by PRODUCE OF CANADANO I GRADE federal and provincial

governments ... Twenty units would each be one bedroom apartments of 460 square feet. The average rent would start at \$37 per month and rise according to means, geared to help low income people. That would include hydro, phone, heat, water, everything except television.




