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# Tempers flare as council hassle

Tempers flared as Halton Hills council battled over the minutes of the works committee meeting of July 28 at the August 5 meeting of council. In the end only a last ditch series of special motions kept the entire results of the works committee meeting from going down the drain.

Everything had gone smoothly with council making only minor changes to the committee's minutes, until the councillors came to the last recommendation which dealt with the hiring of a deputy engineer.

Works committee had suggested the town advertise for a deputy engineer and the committee interview applicants during the first week of September.

Several members of council immediately complained that if the works committee did the interviews then it would change town policy which has always been to have the personnel committee conduct interviews.

Councillor Ernie Sykes said the town should continue its current policy and that the personnel committee should conduct all interviews.

Councillor Len Cox argued that since the works committee would be working closely with the new deputy engineer, the committee should conduct the interviews with the help of any interested members of council.

Councillor Joe Hurst supported this view.

Councillor Roy Booth complained that administration committee works closely with the fire chiefs and recreation directors but they always let the personnel committee conduct the interviews since that was established town policy.

Hurst said he would support any move by administration committee to hire people for departments under their supervision without the help of the personnel committee.

An amendment was put forth which would have made the personnel committee the interviewing committee when it comes time to hire a deputy engineer but it was defeated.

Next some council members put a resolution before council which would have made the personnel committee the interviewing committee with the chairman of the works committee invited to participate along with any other members of council. The resolution was not voted on because debate was resumed.

Councillor Mike Armstrong said that if this was done there could be as many as eight people at the interviews and that the applicants would feel like they were at the Watergate hearings.

Councillor Russ Miller noted he has been a member of the interviewing sessions and he has never seen more than six people there. He noted usually it was difficult to get enough councillors out for the interviews.

Councillor Ern Hyde suggested the councillors were simply standing on protocol and asked everyone

to show the works committee some consideration because the job of interviewing deputy engineer applicants "was properly the works committee's concern."

When it came time to vote on acceptance of the works committee minutes the vote ended in a tie and the entire minutes were defeated, including the one controversial recommendation.

On the recorded vote, five councillors, Booth, Miller, Sykes, Pat McKenzie and Harry Levy voted against the minutes while Hurst, Hyde, Cox, Armstrong and Mayor Hill voted in favor of accepting the minutes. Because it was a tie vote the motion to accept the minutes was defeated.

The defeat of the minutes brought out considerable rage among some members of council.

"Many times some of us opposed a part of minutes but when the amendments were lost we always supported accepting the minutes. Those who have voted against the minutes would be ashamed of themselves. I suggest we take the vote again because this one was taken without some members exercising same consideration," Hyde charged.

Mayor Hill noted a second vote couldn't be taken and the works committee would now have to go back and pass the other recommendations of their July 28 meeting all over again.

Booth suggested that the vote was proper and the results were simply part of the democratic process.

Hurst said he regretted the results of the vote because it would prevent the town from advertising for applications for the job of deputy engineer.

Mayor Hill said the works committee would have to come back again with all their recommendations and warned the council that all committees must now be prepared to have their minutes face the same fate as the works committee meetings because a precedent had been set.

Sykes attacked the mayor for voting with the works committee and not supporting a long standing town policy.

"Are you saying I shouldn't have the right to vote the way I want to. I have every right to my own opinion and you had better not forget it," the mayor lashed out.

Council then proceeded with other business and at the end of the meeting three motions were presented in the hopes of saving the works committee minutes.

The first motion set aside the town's procedural-by-law making it possible for the committee's minutes to be reintroduced. This motion passed.

Next a motion was put before council that provided for passing of all the works committee recommendations with the exception of part dealing with the hiring of a deputy engineer. This motion also passed.

To wrap up the meeting the council voted in favor of a motion making the personnel committee the interviewing committee for the hiring of a deputy engineer. Even the works committee members voted in favor of this motion.

relatively new field in Ontario.

Part of the terms of reference for the study now about to begin will be to review the McLaren Report.

That report was commissioned a few years back by Halton County. It recommends, among other things, that a major landfill site to serve all of Halton be established near Ashgrove. That recommendation has been heavily contested by residents and politicians from that area.

In spite of a number of public and committee meetings held to discuss the problem, no firm decisions have been made. Meanwhile regional public works officials continue to tell the committee that time is running out on the existing landfill sites in the region.

Milton's site closed just prior to the introduction of regional government, Acton's closed recently and sites in Burlington, Oakville and Halton Hills have short life spans.

Open tanks now fenced

The open oil tanks at Oref Industries have been safely surrounded by fencing, according to the O.P.P. The company is no longer in business, but the open tanks filled with oil had concerned the police. Snow fencing now encircles the problematical tanks.
