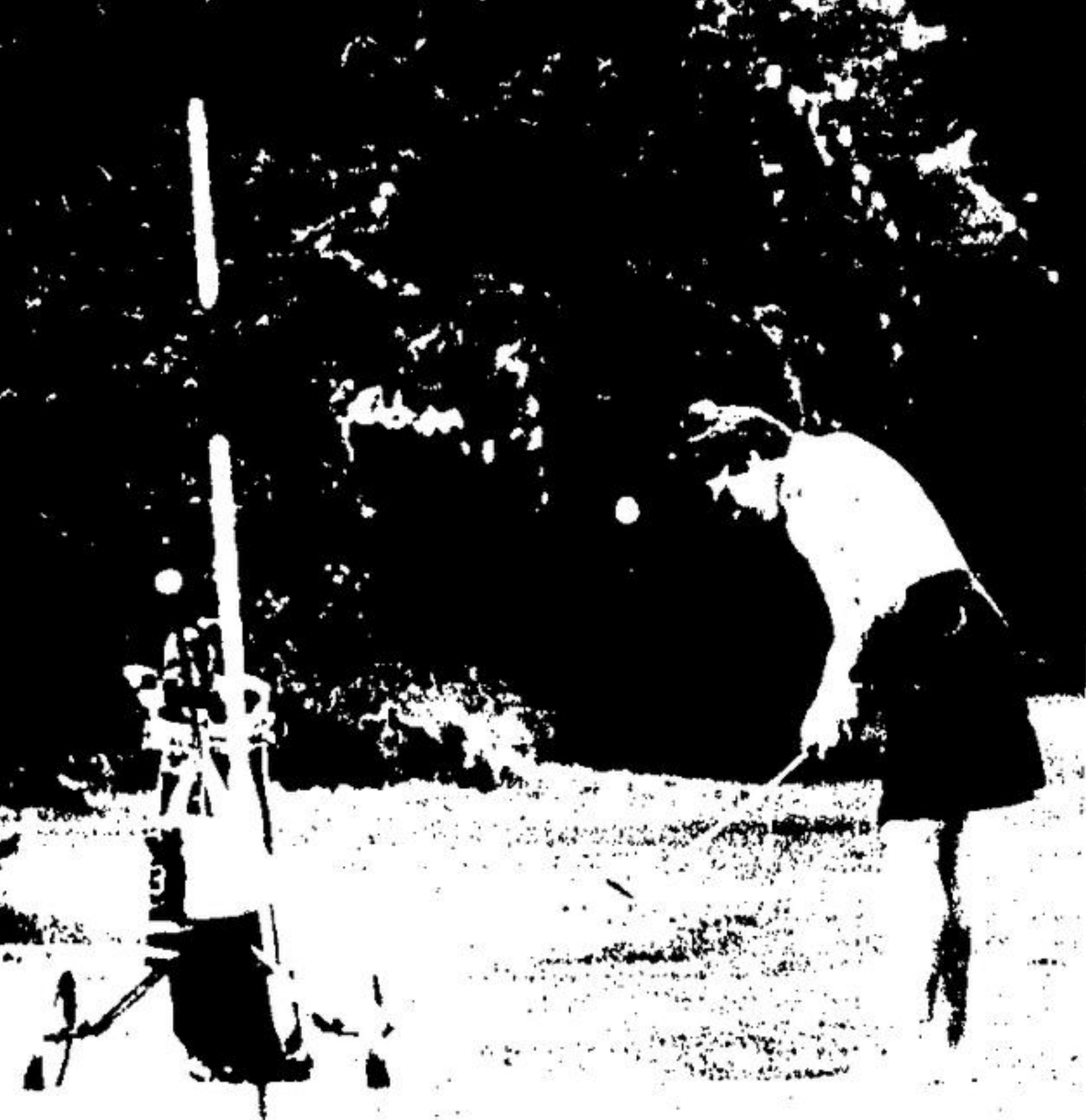
ing a 2-1 lead.
