

Judge James Fuller sworn into office

A 46-year-old Oakville lawyer and father of four children was sworn in Monday afternoon in Milton as a provincial judge.

Judge James Fuller is Halton's new family and juvenile court judge.

He has acted as a part-time crown-attorney in Halton for the past eight years.

More than 75 persons attended the formal ceremony at the Halton Courthouse, including at least 12 judges and more than 30 Halton lawyers.

Chief Judge Andrews of the provincial court administered the oaths of office.

The family of Judge Fuller was present for the afternoon ceremony, including his attractive wife Lynn and daughter Cindy, 15, as well as sons Mark, 21, and Michael, 17. Another son Chris, 22, is away at college in the United States and was unable to attend.

Judge Fuller is to succeed Judge Kenneth M. Langdon

who is approaching retirement.

Judge Langdon took an active part in Monday's ceremony. He was appointed in 1969 after serving for many years as a magistrate.

Judge Fuller will have his office in the new court house on Steeles Ave., Milton as the Halton family and juvenile court headquarters is being shifted there from the old Halton registry office on Brown St. in Milton.
