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Biological inventory

A 3,000 acre parcel of almost total wilderness is being surveyed by four university students who are conducting a biological inventory on the Silver Creek area.

The students are spending 17 weeks in the densely wooded area this summer doing a complete inventory of the entire Silver Creek area, plotting wildlife and sensitive corridors and studying the ecosystem.

The primary purpose of the study in conjunction with the Credit Valley Conservation Authority is to gain a better understanding of the area for the best management possible of the area, according to John Laval of the Authority.

The Conservation Authority has obtained about half of the 3,200 acres in and around the creek area they want to purchase including about 1,000 acres in the valley itself.

The students have catalogued a wide variety of plant and animal life including such predatory birds as red-tailed hawks and great horned owls. Turkey vultures and pileated woodpeckers have also been spotted in vast numbers in the creek area.

Deer, fox, raccoons, beaver and several smaller animals have been sighted by the students, Neil Abrey, Jim Bertull, Karen Yate and Ivan Jakob.
