

Weather station for Halton Hills

Halton Hills is to have its own weather station situated in the picturesque Silver Creek gorge.

The project is being completely underwritten by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority at a cost of \$3,000. The Authority now depends on Toronto International airport at Malton for weather reports. Members want a more accurate

weather analysis for this area.

The first part of the project involves installing rain gauges and low meters in the Silver Creek gorge. In the next couple of months the remaining equipment to record temperatures, humidity, precipitation and wind velocity will be installed to complete

The Authority feels they will have better warning of floods such as those which almost annually afflict Glen Williams during the spring run-off if they have more accurate information from the area of the Niagara Escarpment where flood conditions often originate.
