

Morrow says:

No LIP — cut taxes

Thinking up ways to spend \$150 million in L.I.P. grants available to municipalities roused the ire of Councillors Ern Hyde and Ric Morrow, Tuesday night.

Morrow launched the attack by suggesting the federal government should give back some of the tax money, and was followed by Hyde. He said "We are sitting here struggling to find ways to spend money because it's available. It's not free, it's our own damned money."

Morrow termed the idea "completely objectionable" and an elected council should be trying to think up ways to spend money.

"If the federal government would give us some of our taxes back instead of making us the most heavily taxed country in the free world, we would create a lot more jobs through the natural market process."

Chairman Ern Sykes said he thought a list of possible projects should be drawn up and cited a housing conversion study suggested by Planner Mario Venditti.

The planner said it was just a suggestion since there are a few older homes in Acton and Georgetown which are becoming run-down.

Sykes pointed out the federal government was going to spend the \$150 million anyway, "and we're going to pay for it."

Councillor Pat McKenzie contended there must be useful projects since the money will be spent elsewhere if not in Halton Hills. He said work was needed on the small Silvercreek park, and more play equipment was needed in the Esquering area.

"I'd like to see us involved in L.I.P. grants, but let's run a good one."

Councillor Les Duby stated he had always been disturbed by finding ways to spend money. "Some of the projects

just mean the people are laughing all the way to the bank." He suggested the skeletons of dead elms, prevalent all over the area should be removed under the L.I.P. grants.

Hyde said he could agree with tangible work projects coming under the grant, but not with "graiping at straws."

Morrow made a motion to have the federal government return some of the tax money instead of the L.I.P. grants, but found support only from Hyde.

The matter will be discussed further by council.

Mayor Tom Hill expressed surprise at the reaction of Morrow and Hyde, and said nothing had been said when Dr. Frank Philbrook had explained the program to council.

"That just shows this council can be polite to the federal government," retorted Sykes.

Remaining on the committee are Peter Papillon, Ed Wood and Pam Sheldon. They have been asked by the general administration committee of Halton Hills to meet and decide just what they feel should be done next.

Area co-ordinator John Cooper says this week he hopes the committee can be rebuilt and have a regular meeting within the next couple of weeks.

Fall goal service centre

Steering committee members for the planned Acton multi-service centre in the Y are still working on facilities, funding, staffing, programming, incorporation and organization. They still propose to create the centre this fall.

Committee members planning the new facility here have visited Regent Park Centre, Rexdale or Thistleton Centre, Crouch Neighborhood Centre and the York Multi-Service Centre and have met with board members of these other centres as well as representatives of the Ministry of Community and Social Services.

An election of a board of directors is expected in November.

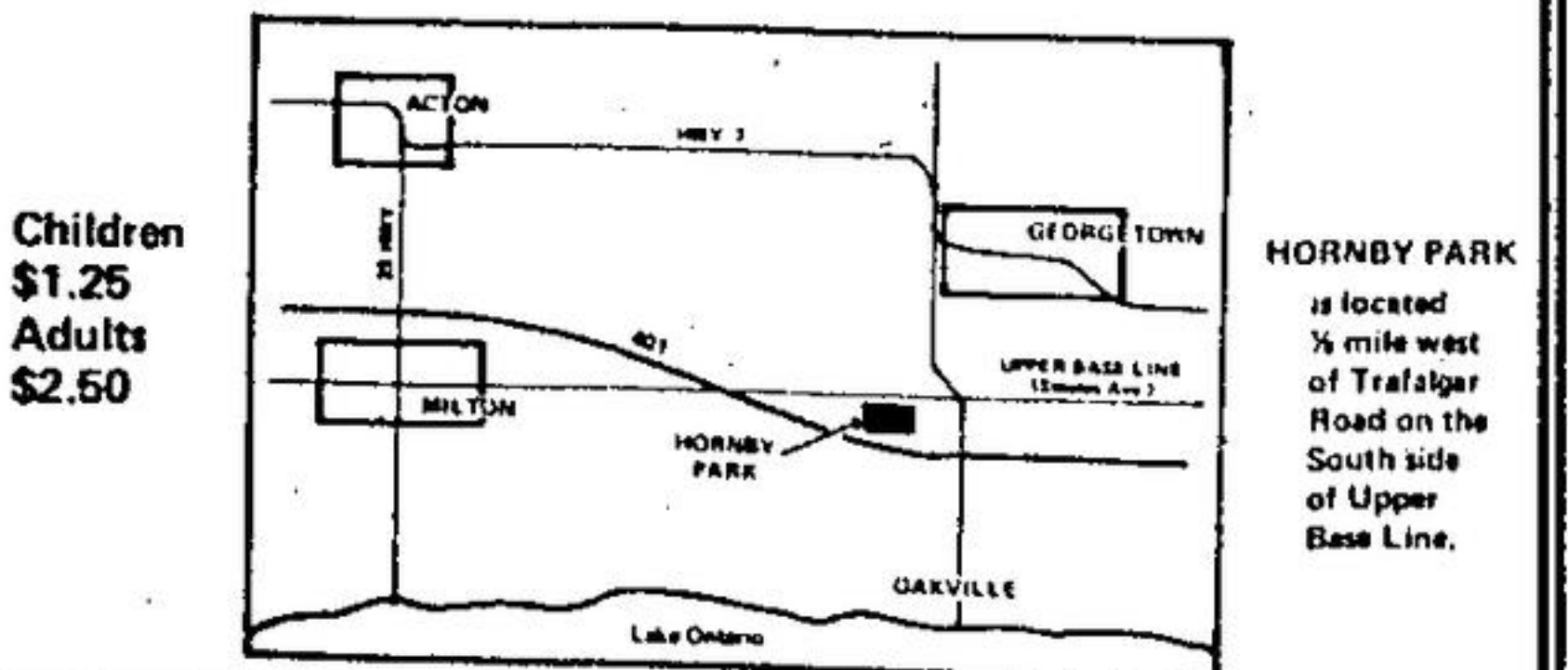
