For the calf, Bruce was fourth, Joseph sixth, and Bill 22nd. All were in the Intermediate Class.
In the Senior Calf Class Lynne Stewart was second and Holly Hurren fourth.

Four scholarships of \$500 each are to be awarded this year and for each of the next 13 years by the Halton Plowmen's Association. These scholarships are the result of the funds received from last year's International Plowing Match held in this Region.
The scholarships are for young men or women with a farm background who are entering degree courses in a Canadian university taking courses in agriculture, home economics or veterinary medicine. The applicants must be residents of Halton with the selection based on academic standing; participation in community activities such as church, 4-H

or Junior Farmers; and leadership qualities. The applicant must be enrolled at the university.
If there are not enough suitable applicants entering the first year of university to

make use of the four scholarships, consideration will be given to students in either second and third years. Application forms are available at the agricultural office, Milton.

Enrolment away up

Enrolments in North Halton schools jumped from 8,514 last June to 8,599 in September, a board official said recently.
Some additional teachers have to be added to staffs since school opened last week. Increases apparently are most predominant in the kindergarten area.
Acton High School reports enrolment of 675 while Georgetown has enrolment of 1,929 and Milton District High School has 1,198 students enrolled.
A total of 5,607 have enrolled in elementary schools in Halton Hills
