The roll call was answered by each with a picture of their farm and its history. Minutes and financial statement followed.

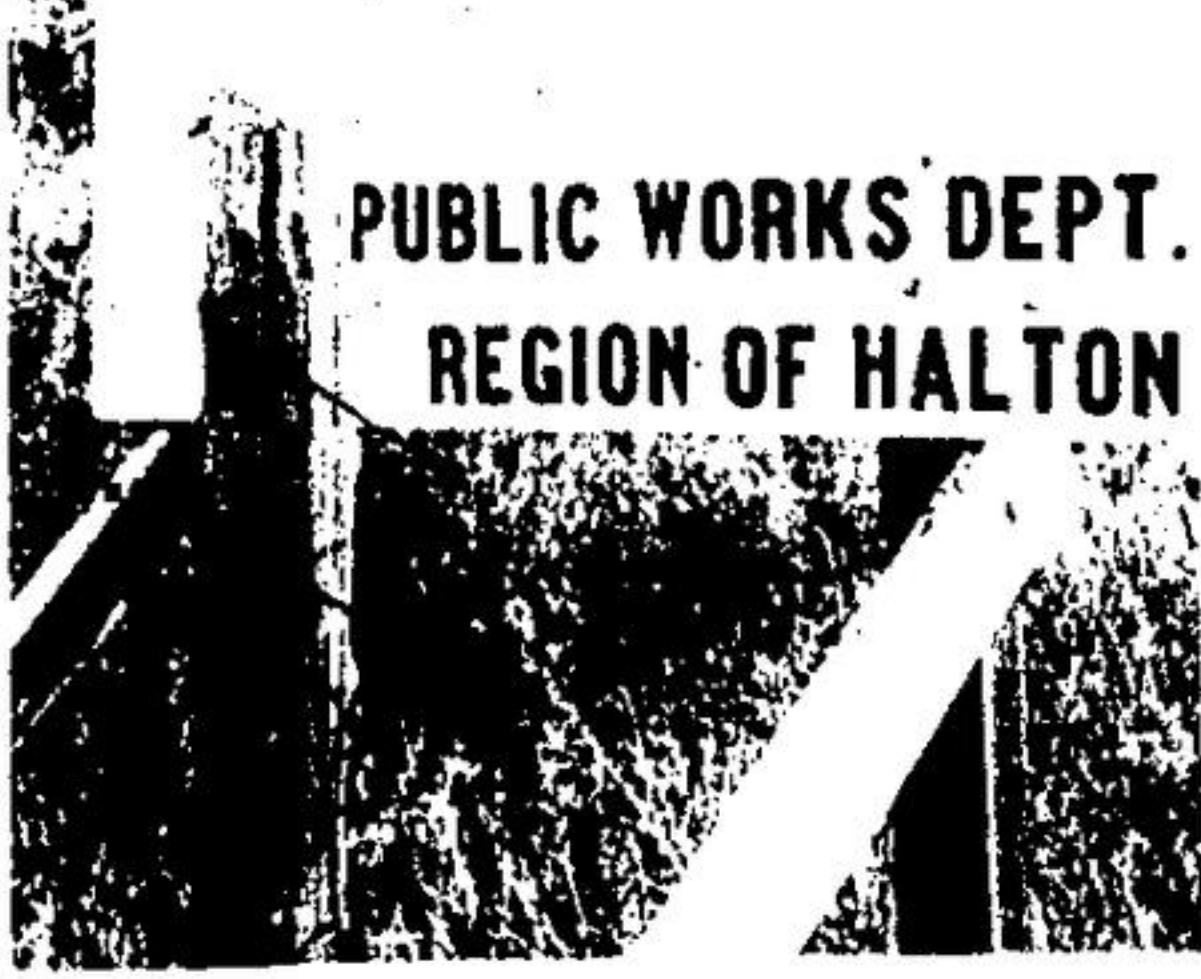

Milton Provincial Jail is overcrowded, has poor ventilation in live cells, and has an inadequate kitchen to handle the number of inmates currently being housed.

Those were comments from the Grand Jury which examined the facility recently. The Grand Jury kept in step with each of the Grand Jurors that have examined the old jail in recent years. It suggested the facility should be shut down and replaced.
The Jury points out that while the maximum accommodation provided for at any one time is 29, the jail now holds 31.

Ballinafad petition uniform speed

At their regular meeting, September 2, Erin Township Council:

—Received a letter from Bill Scott, Ministry of Natural Resources, Cambridge, stating that plans of proposed industrial gravel sites may not be taken out of the township office to be copied as requested by a resident. Those interested may look at them, trace them, or photograph them, but they must remain at the office.

—Passed a motion to request, from Dominion Paving, a copy of the Pits and Quarries licence they are using to extract gravel from lot 11, Concession 4 pit, a copy of the letter to be sent to Natural Resources, Cambridge. Council wonders about the amount being taken out of the pit.

—Discussed the possible purchase of Acton's 1961 fire truck. After hearing the particulars brought by councillor Jack Marshall, council decided "There's no harm in going to look."

—Met with Stan Coles, Town Drywalling Inc., who presented council with an estimate to coat the township garage with textured coating and waterproofing material. "Don't put paint on that building," he cautioned. "You'll be throwing money away."

Road superintendent Ed Barden told Mr. Coles that any expenditure over \$1,000 must be approved by the department of Transport and Communication, Stratford. Council declined to commit themselves any further.

Speed
—Were approached by a delegation from Ballinafad with a petition asking that the speed limit be a uniform 30 miles through the built-up section of town. They told council that the limit is 30 for only two-tenths of a mile. For one short stretch, the speed limit is 35 going north but only 30 going south, due to the signs being in different counties.

After one resident commented it was hard for him to turn into his own driveway because of the speed of approaching traffic, Reeve Donald Matheson said "This is where we're wrong in allowing people to build on roads like this" (the Seventh Line).

Councillor Jack Marshall said the P.P.P. had informed him the speed limit was very hard to enforce in Ballinafad because of all the different speed limits in such a short space (60, 45, 30, 35, 50) but he believed "That it should be more uniform if it's possible to make it such."

Reeve Matheson will take the petition, and also the request of another resident to change the speed limit on the Base Line east of the town from 50 to 30 to the Wellington County engineer.
