Halton Hills council, Tuesday night accepted tenders for various pieces of equipment and works projects.

Halton Truck Sales, Milton were awarded the tender for a 76 International Loadstar, four ton, with snowplow equipment at a cost of \$18,027. North Halton Ford Sales were awarded the tender for a '76 Ford F 250 crew cab at \$5,265, and a '76 Ford F100 at \$4,213.

Duke Lawn Equipment of Burlington received the contract for one 88 inch Mott mower at \$1,374, and Case Power and Equipment for a tractor and loader at \$6,556.

Council approved payment to Provincial Pavement Marking of \$922 for traffic line marking, and Montego Construction, Georgetown were awarded the tender for sidewalk construction at a cost of \$20,567.
