New Canadian Amateur Hockey Association rulings go into effect this season. The aggressor in a fight will be thrown out of a game, states the new rule. Last year the aggressor was given a 10 minute misconduct, no more. It's now the total elimination of the aggressive fighters.

There is only one player change allowed per whistle in the rulings and if a coach makes another to balance a line, then the team is assessed a two minute penalty for delay of game.
