We received a letter from Lois Cunningham, a young missionary from Erin Presbyterian Church, who went last summer to the Un evangelized Field Missions in Brazil. She reports she is content and loving it there. She will have completed her Portuguese language course by October 10.

She says it was very exciting when she was able to understand what the sermon was about for the first time, and was able to carry on a conversation.

July was her holiday month. She remarked how cold it was, July being the middle of winter in Brazil. She went with two friends to Rio de Janeiro and had a terrific time, despite all the extra coats, socks and sweaters they piled on to keep warm.

Between studying, Lois visits among the church people, which helps her practise the Portuguese language. She attends prayer meetings and Young Peoples, and also meets with a young Brazilian girl every week to study the Bible.

She asks for your prayers that the Lord will give her wisdom to be able to explain

the scriptures to her in Portuguese in spite of her limited ability. She ends her letter saying, "The Lord truly is good and has been supplying my every need."

Committee says

No late aid for groups

Requests from citizens' groups for financial assistance in defraying legal expenses incurred in disputes will not be considered "after the fact", Halton Hills Council's finance and personnel committee decided Monday night.

William J. Mann, chairman of the Interested Citizens Group, which is battling the provincial government on the Bradley to Georgetown hydro corridor issue had written council with a request for assistance. Although his mailing address is R.R. 3, Acton, Mr. Mann lives in Erin township.

Councillor Russ Miller said he couldn't recall a similar request coming before the old Esqueping township council.

"I sympathize with these people," he said, "but there are other groups, like the Niagara Escarpment issue."

Councillor Harry Levy suggested there must be literally dozens of citizens groups of a similar nature. He added that if the groups want assistance, they should come to council before, not after their battles.

Councillor Pat McKenzie emphasized that they should come to council beforehand and also before budget time.

Ratepayers groups battling establishment of the Consolidated Sand and Gravel quarry near Speyside and the Toronto International Dragway in the past were recalled by Councillor Miller to illustrate the number of requests with which council could be
