

Halton Hills hires third treasurer in 22 months

Halton Hills council is re- work placing treasurer Harry Henderson, who is leaving this week to work for Oakville, with Henderson's former Chinguacousy township boss, Raymond King.

: At a special meeting Monday night council decided to hire King, who is currently working for the Region of

Councillor Ric Morrow opposed the hiring of King because he said there were many other people who applied for the treasurer's job who had better educational backgrounds.

Morrow noted the last year of the Certified General Accountant program is the most difficult. He said King was going to be taking his last four courses in the program this

Councillor Harry Levy said that each of the 21 applicants for the treasurer's job had been carefully screened. Most of the candidates for the job were already making much more than the town could afford to pay and wouldn't have left their present positions to come to Halton Hills for a pay decrease:

He said the personnel committee interviewed four applicants and that each interview lasted an hour. Levy added the four applicants were each required to answer 45 questions "which gave us a good idea of their background, abilities and municipal experience."

Levy pointed out King is taking a drop in pay to come to Halton Hills and that he has

"He was treasurer at Chinguacousy when our present treasurer was there and Harry worked for him," Levy stated.

He reminded councillors that on the surface other applicants might appear to be more qualified from an edu-cational standpoint but that the town either couldn't afford the others or else they didn't have any municipal experience.

Councillor Pat McKenzie said that King was the treasurer in Chinguacousy when the township was going through a difficult period just prior to regional government in Peel and that he had proved he has ability.

"We did consider another man for a time but we all agreed King can carry on the things Harry bas started here in the last nine months. They know each other, have worked together, and Harry and Raymond will compliment each other," hexexplained.

Councillor Ern Hyde sald he didn't really care about a persons long list of degrees and noted most people realize that practical experience and proven ability are more valu-

He said it would be hard for anyone to fill Henderson's shoes but that King appeared to be the man who could best fill the bill.

King, 33, a resident of Caledon East, joined the staff of Chinguacousy Township in 1964 and became treasurer two years later. Before becoming deputy treasurer for Chinguacousy in 1965 he spent

a year performing various accounting duties for the township. He was treasurer in Chinguacousy for eight years.

When Chinguacousy disappeared in 1974 because of regional government King moved over to the region and became its chief accountant.

From 1958 until 1963 Halton Hills' new treasurer was first the clerk for board administration and later board accountant for the Central Peel District High School Board.

His educational background includes completion of the three year International Accountants Society program which delved into ac-

counting, ecomomics and office management.


