School bus problems stir anger in parents

Every autumn, without fail, people remark on the beauty of the trees. But this year I can honestly say, "I have never seen them quite so startlingly glorious." The many shades and hues of red and gold, amber and orange are simply breathtaking, especially on days blessed with sunshine like last Sunday and Monday. Did any of you notice this past weekend, the countless numbers of hikers, bikers and Sunday drivers stopped on our country roads with cameras in hand, trying to capture the myriad of colours on film? Mother Nature has outdone herself this Autumn.

First prizes

We have a handful of Speyside children who won first prizes at the Acton Fall Fair and they deserve some recognition for projects well done.

Grade six student Hoy Stull handcrafted a handsome book rack in his carpentry elective which came first. Grade two student Jody De Vries' art project came first, Billy Gibbs, Grade five received two firsts, one for the largest and best maple leaf and one for his button collection. Grade five pupil Laura Spalding received a first for her imaginative piece of murraine.

Another Speyside girl and her pony did very well in the Children's Horse Show. Nine year old Elizabeth Wilson of the 15 sideroad, and her black Exmoor pony, Beauty, won first prize in the Walk and Trot category for age 13 and under. Beauty, feeling a ribbon was of no special interest to her, proceeded to eat all the potatoes for the potato race, much to Elizabeth's chagrin. If that wasn't enough, she then ran off with the sacks for the sack race. C'mon, Beauty, quit horsin' around!

School bus fees

Seems we have a bussing problem here in Speyside. You will recall, at the beginning of this school year the Board of Education cut the number of buses needed to service our area by two. The reason cited was, of course, economics. Route five, which runs on the west side of Hwy. 25, was serviced last year by two buses but this year uses just one bus.

On Friday, last, the children on Route five came home with notes from Esquering Bus Lines stating they must be prepared to board the bus each morning anywhere from 17 to 25 minutes earlier than the usual 8 a.m. time. The route has been turned around, requiring 25 children to board at 7:30 a.m. and ride the bus for 45 minutes both to and from school. Incredibly, these 25 children, who live just one mile from the school, must now travel 12 miles and 45 minutes before they reach the school.

The note from Esquering Bus Lines stated the reasons for the change were "in the interest of efficient transportation." Obviously, the word efficient has been misused. The change in bus route has also endangered some children on the 15 sideroad as the drop-off points are treacherous. The parents of these 25 children are endeavouring to arrange a meeting with the Board of Education, and in the interim are driving their children to and from school. It is im-

portant to stress that no one wants "the best" route for them, while inconveniencing

kids at the other end of the route. The answer to this problem is an obvious one - reinstate one bus.

The Kindergarten class had a surprise visitor last week from Constable Woods of the Halton Region Police. Kindergarten teacher Isabel Weaver told me she was expecting Constable Woods to lecture the children on safety, but instead, to their delight, the smartly dressed officer spent his time simply letting

the children get to know just what a policeman really is. The children were dazzled when he let them touch his badge and hat and Vanessa Mitchell even had a chance to wear the handcuffs. Constable Woods successfully conveyed the message to the class that "a policeman is a child's friend," and on his leave he promised them he would be back soon to give them a lesson on safety.
