

Antique Market Aberfoyle

A trip to the Aberfoyle Antique Market is a perfect way to spend a sunny Sunday afternoon in the fall. From May to mid-October the grounds off Highway 6 north of Highway 401 are crowded with visitors. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The market features dozens of booths where independent vendors display everything from old phonograph records to real finds in antique furniture. It's a great place to take the kids for a live history lesson.

On the grounds the Aberfoyle General Store

features local produce, natural foods, crafts and unusual, hard-to-find items.

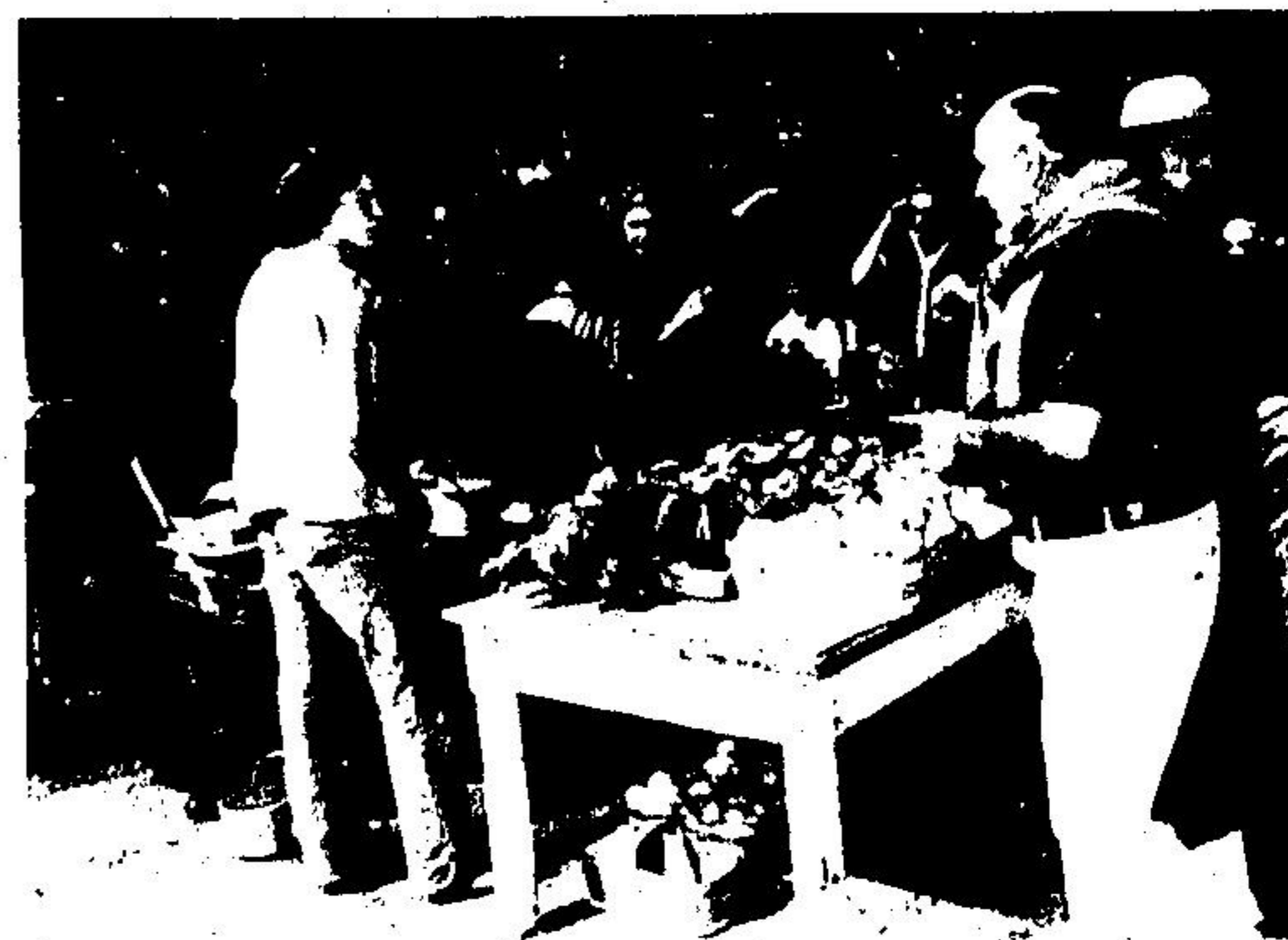
Artisans' Village

Aberfoyle Artisans' Village shows 15 craftspeople displaying and demonstrating their talents. There's pottery, jewellery, pine furniture, candles, toys, batik, macrame, plants, weaving, quilts and metal-work.

The Slaughterhouse serves home cooked meals to be eaten either inside or out. It's also open as a coffee house Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights with musicians playing.

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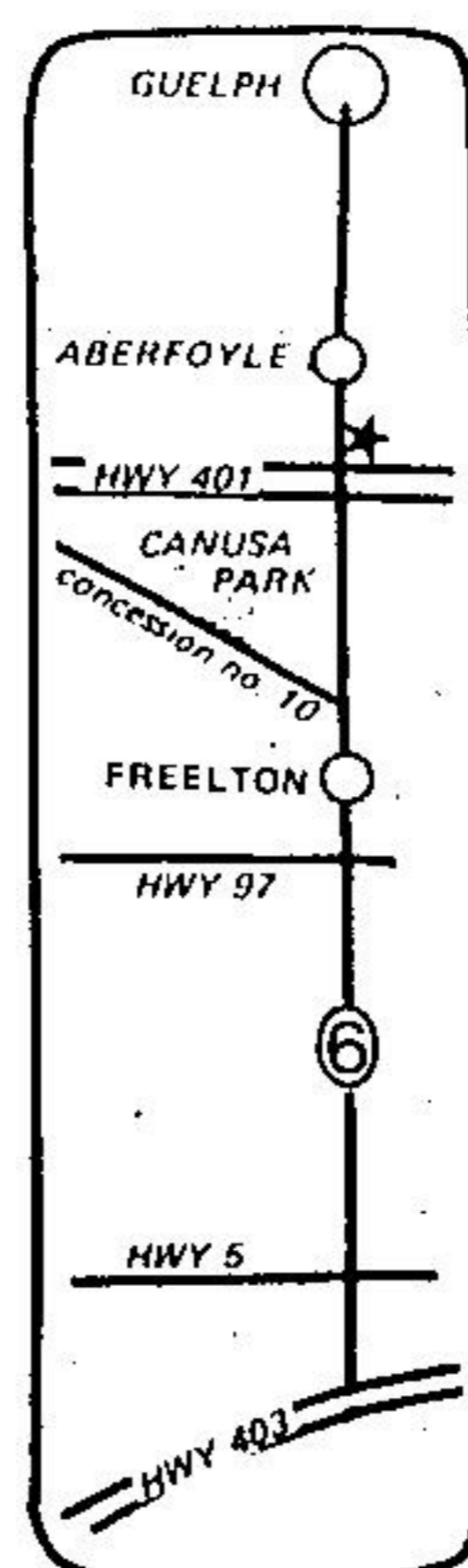

Fresh fruit and vegetables are plentiful in the fall.



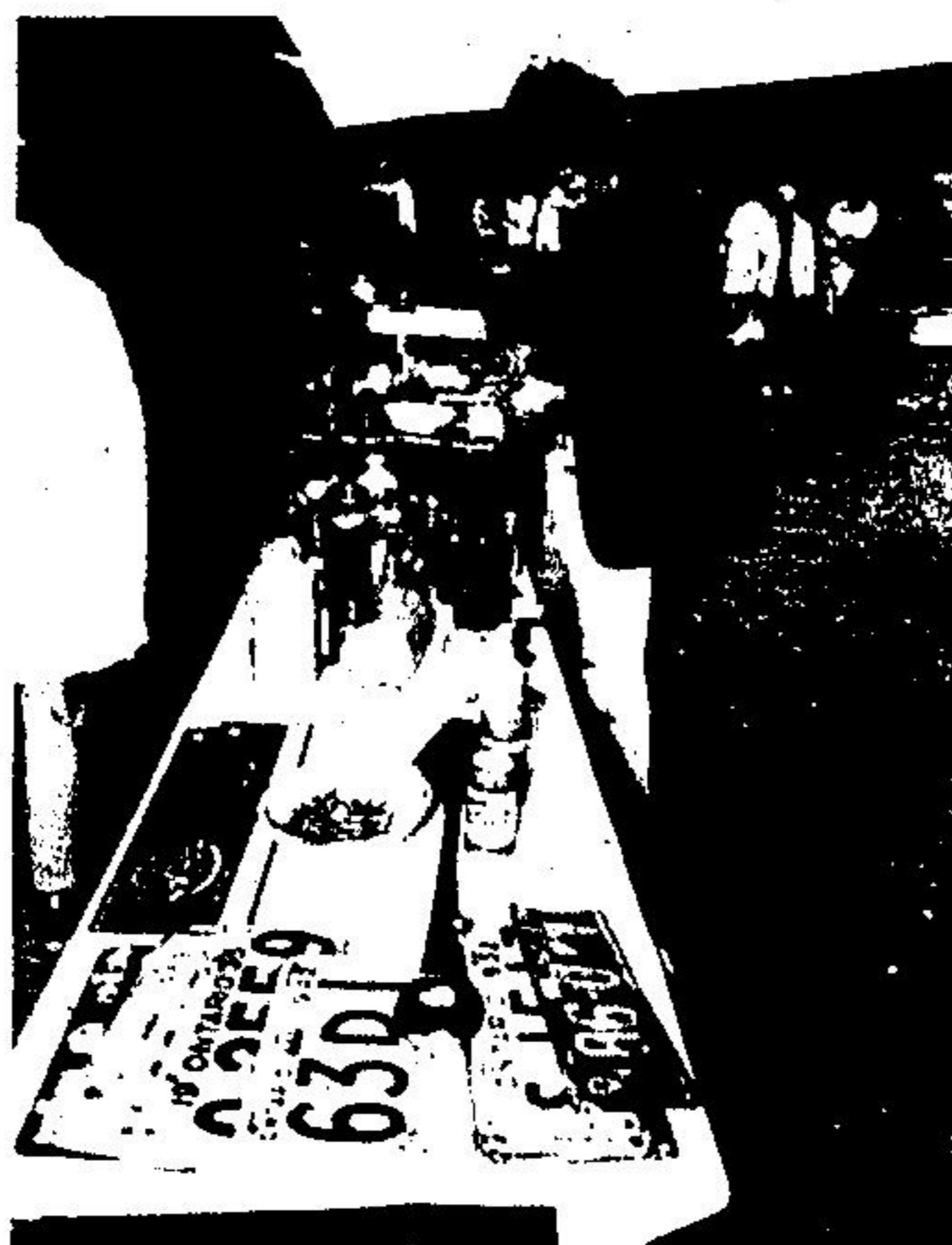
Inside the Slaughterhouse home-cooked meals are served.
