Province advises region to put dump in Ashgrove

Farmland in the Ashgrove area could still become a huge dump for regional garbage if one Queen's Park official has his way. In a letter to Halton regional council Ministry of the Environment regional director P. G. Cockburn urged the region to get going and implement the recommendations of the 1974 MacLaren report.

Howls of protest erupted from Ashgrove farmers last fall when the James MacLaren Environmental Consultants, Toronto, recommended that the best location for a regional landfill site would be the Ashgrove area. Residents of the area complained that the report wanted to turn prime agricultural land into a massive dump. Area farmers were also worried about the traffic problems caused by garbage trucks coming to the area from all over Halton.

Following the public outcry the region asked the Dillon firm to examine alternate dump sites including the possibility of several sites. At a public meeting of Ashgrove area residents in Stewarttown last year Minister of Government Services and then MPP for Halton East Jim Snow suggested that with the announcement of a reclamation plant for Halton there was a possibility a dump would be located near the plant. He told the audience of worried farmers that a reclamation plant dump project would mean Ashgrove might not get all of Halton's garbage dumped on the hamlet's doorstep.

In his letter to council Cockburn says the landfill problem in Halton is urgent and he claims the short life left for Halton's existing dumps means implementation of the MacLaren report is necessary. Cockburn suggested the region quit looking for alternative sites and claimed the MacLaren report offered a simple, flexible system which will minimize environmental impact. The MacLaren plan can easily be tied into the province's waste recycling program, he added.

The letter stressed time is running out and the MacLaren report must be implemented.

Consultants stop study

Queen's Park has stopped work on a study for a waste reclamation plant for Halton. In a letter to consultant M. M. Dillon a Ministry of the Environment official told the firm to "cease and desist" all work on the study until the question of public participation has been straightened out by regional council.

Region mileage

Halton Regional staffs will receive 10 cents per mile for the first 500 miles per month on their mileage allowance and 16 cents per mile after that.

That rate applies to employees driving their own cars on company business, except for those who have special agreements under union contracts with the region. Burlington Councillor Mary Munro said she felt that rate was over and above what was being paid in other municipalities and industry.
