They were originally planted in a flower pot in his home at R.R. 2, Acton last March and were transferred outside once the summer came. He picked the plants last week and discovered one with 18 peanuts on the end. He had five plants altogether.

## Peanuts growing plant has 18 nuts

Frank Freeman of R.R.2 Acton and his son Ted, of Fourth Line, Eramosa, have an answer to soaring food costs.

Last March, Mr. Freeman planted five shelled peanuts in a flower pot in his home, just to see what would happen. When summer came the plants were big enough to be transported to the ground outside. After several months Mr. Freeman was ready to pick the plants.

Above the ground, a small leafy plant was visible, but what was below the surface, Mr. Freeman did not know.

Last week, when he pulled the plants, peanuts, just like the kind available in stores, were growing. One plant had 18 shells, others almost as many.

His son Ted in the meantime averaged five to ten peanuts per plant. Both had grown mature peanuts without special fertilizer. Their experiment had worked.

They may not be in the position to close down stores selling peanuts due to lack of business, but they did save themselves a day's spending money on the delicacy.

# Wolves kill eight animals

September was a bad month for one Halton Hills farmer as wolves killed five of his sheep, three lambs and injured two other animals.

Halton Hills council last week authorized compensation payments worth \$355 for Librato Franchino, Lot 23, Concession 6, for the loss of his animals.

Wolves killed three lambs and hurt another when they attacked his animals on September 12.

Just seven days later wolves returned to the Franchino farm and killed two sheep and on September 26 they killed three sheep and injured another.

Deputy clerk Delmar French informed council that Mr. Franchino has now sent all of his animals to market in Toronto so the town won't be forced to make any more compensation payments.
